# P430-K shabu seized, 3 nabbed in CSF

CITY OF SAN FERNANDO – Three suspected drug dealers yielded P430,000-worth of suspected shabu after they were nabbed in a police entrapment operation in Barangay San Jose here at noon-time of Monday.

An undercover operative was able to buy a sachet of shabu worth P1,000 from a woman who goes by the alias “Nafs” which prompted her arrest and her two male cohorts.

Pampanga police drug enforcement unit chief Major Louie Gonzaga said Nafs, a high value target, has been in the police radar since her release from jail for cases related to illegal drugs.

“Nakulong na rin siya before, with a similar case of drug offense, she was incarcerated for four years, kaya lang nung makalabas hindi pa rin nagbago tumuloy pa rin dun sa trabaho nila, ito na-monitor namin na hindi pa tumigil, in fact lalo pang lumakas,” said Gonzaga.

During body search, police found in the suspects’ possession 63 grams of suspected shabu with an estimated street value of no less than P430,00.

Gonzaga said the suspects who come from Manila take their illegal drug trade to Bulacan, Pampanga, and Tarlac.

Police are still determining the possibility of a large drug syndicate group behind the suspects who are now facing charges for violation of the Comprehensive Dangerous Drugs Act. **—BZL with media reports**

# Suspect in rape, attempted slay of 9-year-old girl killed

MASINLOC, Zambales – The suspect in the rape and attempted slay of a 9-year-old girl last Wednesday in Palauig town was killed in a shoot-out with police in Masinloc Sunday.

Police said they were closing in on the hideout of Christopher Abella alias “Angel” in Sitio Bolinting, Barangay San Lorenzo, Masinloc when they were fired upon by the suspect, prompting them to return fire.

The suspect was hit in the chest which led to his instantaneous death, police said. A .38 pistol was reportedly seen near his dead body. Abella who was the subject of a police manhunt after committing the heinous crime was said to have been seen by two girls Sunday morning in a river near a place called Burik at the boundary of Palauig and Masinloc.

The girls reported his presence to the residents nearby who in turn tipped the police.

**Reward**

With the death of the suspect, came now the question on who will receive the P100,000 reward money promised by Palauig Mayor Billy Aeron to anyone who could provide information on Abello’s whereabouts.

Will it be the tipsters or the police?

Aeron said early Monday morning that he was still “in the blank” on the rightful recipient of the award which he said will be discussed in a meeting with the police.

# 18 new cases, 18 new recoveries

BALANGA CITY -- Gov. Albert Garcia on Tuesday announced that Bataan registered 18 new confirmed cases and 18 new recoveries from the coronavirus disease.

This, the governor said, caused the rise in confirmed cases to 3,030 and the number of those who have recovered to 2,784.

The provincial health office said there are 183 active cases who are all isolated and 63 deaths from the virus.

The new confirmed cases are four from Orani, three

each from Dinalupihan, Li-may and Samal, two from Mariveles, and one each from Morong, Orion, and Balanga City. The oldest is 90 years old and the youngest at four years old.

Those who have newly recovered are 11 from Balanga City, four from Mariveles, two from Orani, and one from Li-may, with the oldest at 70 years old and the youngest at three years old.

A total of 32,531 have so far undertaken Covid-19 tests with 29,241 already found negative and 260 still waiting for results.

# Gapan mayor, sister in quarantine despite testing negative of Covid

CABANATUAN CITY - Mayor Emerson Pascual of Gapan City and his sister, 4<sup>th</sup> District board member Joy Pascual, tested negative of the coronavirus disease even as some of their relatives turned positive.

But the mayor, in a Facebook live feed Tuesday night, said they will undergo 14-day quarantine.

“Positive sa Covid-19 ang tatay ko si Kapitan B, ang Nanay ko, at si Judee,” the mayor said referring to his father Pambuan barangay chair Boy Pascual, his mother and his wife. “Maayos naman ang kanilang kalagayan,” he assured.

“Ako at si Bokal Joy negative sa Covid -9,” Pascual added.

The board member’s swab test result that showed negative was released Tuesday, he said.

In the live video with his sister by his side, Pascual explained he has been living in a house away from his own family since the start of the pandemic. “Pero kahit negative sa swab test kailangan ko 14 days home quarantine at susundin po natin yan,” he said.

“Huwag po kayo mag-alala patuloy ako magtatrabaho at pagkatapos ng quarantine ko magkikita-kita uli tayo sa labas. Patuloy akong magtatrabaho para sa inyo,” said Pascual who earned the admiration of the public for giving away cavans of rice, cash and meat products to his constituents during the lockdown.

He also had physically checked the barangays in his town for their preparedness for Typhoon Ulysses.

“Napapagod pero hindi susuko,” he added.

# Modern sports complex to rise in Bataan

BALANGA CITY -- A modern sports complex will soon rise in an upland village here to serve not only athletes but even ordinary men and women who will enjoy a spacious area in their daily exercise routine.

Gov. Albert Garcia on Tuesday said that he has taken up the matter with his brother, Balanga City Mayor Francis Garcia, who he said expressed full support to the project.

The governor and the mayor have discussed the plan with city and provincial school and sports officials who wanted the project implemented soonest.

It will rise on a 15-hectare land in the upland village of Dangcol in this city.

## Prescient Gina

“WHO SUFFERS if you kill the environment? It’s the poor. And whose duty is it to protect our people? It’s the government. And when you make decisions based on business interests, you have shirked your responsibility. You have lost the moral ascendancy to rule the government because, to you, business and money are more important than the welfare of our people.”

The valedictory of Gina Lopez, at her March 3, 2017 rejection by the Commission on Appointments as secretary of the Department of the Environment and Natural Resources has come to haunt the nation in the wake of successive typhoons Pepito, Quinta, super-strong Rolly, Siony, and ultra-devastating Ulysses.

Now everybody weeps, hailing the prescience, if not the prophetic vision, of the dearly lamented Gina.

Even more precise was Lopez when she warned in Sept. 2017: “It is important that we rehabilitate this watershed because it is the first line of defense of Marikina, Quezon City, Antipolo, Pasig, Cainta, San Mateo, etc., against rainwater surging from the uplands of Luzon.”

Furthering: “As long as there is quarrying there and the Marikina Watershed is denuded, the Pasig River water will be brown and it will become more and more shallow, and it will cause flooding in Metro Manila. It is imperative that the Marikina Watershed is reforested.”

In remembering Lopez, let us not forget the Chamber of Mines of the Philippines which vehemently opposed Lopez’s appointment, thanking profusely the CA for rejecting her, hailing it as “the ‘beginning of a new chapter for the mining industry.’”


“We reiterate our commitment to work with the DENR and the next Secretary to protect the environment and promote the responsible use of our natural resources,” the group of miners declared at that time.

New chapter indeed, ushering the Apocalypse.

So, who were the legislators that voted for the rejection of Lopez?

If only to appease the Furies, someone or some people have got to be lynched.

### Shepherd's Call

## Amazing Grace

JOHN IS having a vision in our first reading from the esoteric book of Revelation. He makes us imagine God sending letters to seven Churches and dictating his messages to the angels assigned to look after these Churches. Today he is writing to two Churches: Sardis and Laodicea, both located in ancient Asia Minor, the modern-day Turkey.

The one that is more closely related to the Gospel today is the second letter, the one addressed to the Church in Laodicea. It is almost a description of Zacchaeus in today’s Gospel reading, before he encountered Jesus: “You think you are rich and affluent and yet do not realize that you are wretched, pathetic, poor, blind, and naked. I advise you to buy from me gold refined by fire that you may be (truly) rich...”

Why do I think this describes Zacchaeus? Luke tells us he was “short in stature”. I wonder if he meant that literally or figuratively. But actually, it can apply in both senses. I am inclined to believe that this man has had enough of being bullied, ridiculed or belittled because of his smallness, shortness or his inadequacies. There comes a point when a person who has been abused may develop a syndrome, if he is unable to process the experience. In his desire to get even with his oppressors, he may end up turning oppressive himself, using his ingenuity to reinforce himself with the armor of power that could give him a sense of invincibility.

Luke gives us a good illustration in Zacchaeus: when he is unable to see Jesus passing by because he is short of stature and his view is blocked, he runs ahead and climbs a tree. The evangelist has a way of being both literal and figurative in the way he tells his story. He succeeds in picturing Zacchaeus to us as a man who has learned well how to assert himself, how to compete and prove his worth by treating life like a marathon—that it’s just a matter of getting ahead of everyone else, that the challenge is just about being skillful at running ahead, climbing and gaining a better vantage point. He seems to have learned very well the art of social climbing. He reminds me of the girl whom Madonna sings about in her famous song, MATERIAL GIRL. She says, “Experience has made me rich, and now they running after me, ‘coz we are living in a material world and I am a material girl.”

Zacchaeus must have turned into a material boy himself, an expert in social and economic climbing. Luke tells us he became so good at it, he became a chief tax collector and a very wealthy man. But he seemed to have been conscious of the fact that he was doing all this by defrauding the poor and committing extortion.

I think an angel had visited him before this and spoken to him about Jesus. He may have been haunted by things people told him Jesus had preached about—like, “What does it profit a man if he gains the whole world and loses himself?” He may have heard of Jesus opening the eyes of the blind, making the lame walk again, seeking out the lost, and deep in his

heart he knew he was one of them.

Luke tells us Zacchaeus longed to see what Jesus was like. He was probably curious to know how come this carpenter who is a virtual nobody from Nazareth is being looked up to by many people. How come he is poor but seems like he has so much to give? Perhaps Zacchaeus had come to that point in his life where he suffered in silence and said to himself, “Here I am, rich and powerful but hated and looked down upon, ridiculed for my job? I wish I can see him. I wish I can learn from him. I wonder if he would pay any attention to someone like me.”

And so he used the same techniques he had often used before—of trying to run ahead, trying to climb whatever needs to be climbed to be in a position of advantage. But something he did not expect happened. Suddenly, the man he had been looking up to stopped right where he was and looked up at him, perhaps even smiled at him and greeted him like a long-lost friend in order to say that he wanted to have dinner with him.

Zacchaeus must have held back for a while. He is like the homeowner we hear about in our first reading who is being invited to welcome the Lord, “Here I am, knocking at your door; if you open up I will enter and have supper with you.” IF YOU OPEN UP... He decided to open up and let Jesus in. And what an experience of liberation it had become for him.

Suddenly he no longer felt small. And all he was being asked to do was to come down, to stop running ahead of everyone else, to stop stepping on others to climb up much higher in the social ladder, to stop trying to prove himself. It was like the message I quoted from Isaiah a few days ago about how he was able to conquer his fear when heard God saying to him: “You are precious in my sight; you are mine.” And so Zacchaeus learned from Jesus a new way of going up, by coming down, the way of kenosis, the way of finding fulfillment through self-emptying.

There is an old religious song that does not fail to strike a chord in people whose lives have been changed by their encounter with Jesus: AMAZING GRACE. It is the kind of song that can bring tears to the eyes of one like Zacchaeus:

AMAZING GRACE, HOW SWEET THE SOUND THAT SAVED A WRTCH LIKE ME. To Zacchaeus, the sound was unforgettable: COME DOWN ZACCHAEUS. HE WAS NEVER THE SAME AFTER HE RESPONDED TO THE INVITATION.

He would look back and say, “I once was lost and now I’m found, was blind but now I see.”

## TODAY IN PHILIPPINE HISTORY

### The Iwahig Prison and Penal Farm in Palawan province is established

ON NOVEMBER 16, 1904, the Iwahig Prison and Penal Farm in Palawan province where offenders sentenced to banishment were exiled, was established. It was designated for this purpose during the Spanish regime but was only implemented until the American occupation.

The Iwahig facility was established for Filipinos who resisted the Americans’ bid to colonize the Philippines. Governor Luke Wright authorized

the establishment of the penal colony which originally covered 22 acres.

Prisoners who could not be accommodated at Bilibid Prisons in Manila served their sentences at Iwahig.

Unlike most prisons and other penal institutions, Iwahig’s minimum security prisoners are not locked up behind bars. Only those classified as either medium or maximum security prisoners are subjected to tight monitoring.

Iwahig’s minimum security prisoners engage in agricultural work and live in dormitories. If permitted by the Bureau of Corrections, some of the inmates are allowed to live with their families and can also work at Iwahig’s vast land.

To generate income, some of them even set up shops and sell handicrafts handmade by prisoners. The inmates can even access educational opportunities and skills training.

### Looking for Number One

WHILE A strong typhoon blows through a neighborhood, what's wrong with children asking why the father isn't around to make them feel safe?

There is Serbian wisdom that, when things get tough or rough, a child needs a father even if he's just sitting in the corner. His presence may be enough to allay fear or feel his protection while in harm's way.

So why did Harry the Spox dissuade netizens, even critics, from asking his boss' whereabouts when three strong typhoons wreaked havoc in many parts of the country recently? It's as legit as prayer in times of danger.

Why did President Duterte apparently took umbrage with his sovereign citizens who, presumably not from his base, wondered why he was out of sight while his bloviating jester was presiding over Cabinet meetings to address the impending disasters?

In the first place, he was supposed to be there doing the job, so it's logical for people to raise that query. Is the President in top shape, given rumors the contrary or TV footage prior to the storms? How prepared is the government in dealing with the threats of destruction and devastation to a country already reeling under the pandemic?

Those who were looking for Duterte at the height of the storms were, presumably, not his pros, part of the minority that put him in office through the constitutional loophole in our democracy that allows a minority president to stand majority rule on is head.

It is said that Nero played the fiddle while Rome was burning. The great Mahatma Gandhi was said to be enjoying his wife while his father was dying in the next room. Duterte was supposed to be attending an ASEAN summit while 'Ulysses' was driving up storm surges in coastal provinces and blowing houses apart.

Unlike Nero and Gandhi, though, Duterte has a constitutional responsibility, not the least being the commander-in-chief of all the armed forces, including the Philippine National Police which prides in its "to serve and protect" motto, to fulfill -- with a sense of priority, needless to say.

Shouldn't he exemplify the motto, especially in a time as dire as a strong typhoon blasting everything in its path, even by just simply being there to be at the emergency Cabinet meetings? The buck stops where he's at, not at where his alter ego is. The Spox is there to be the ego's bullhorn, not the ego itself.

That, partly, should explain the netizens' expressed uneasiness and discomfort on his absence. Is that too difficult to understand?

Woody Allen has said presence is 50 percent of success. More than showbiz, political astuteness demands it. Did Duterte's absence during the meetings/briefings on the raging typhoons as these were dumping record rainfalls and mighty winds contributed to some people's observation that the government failed in providing enough preparation and assistance to vulnerable communities?

Or did the President need a break from the series of calamities, particularly the pandemic, that was too much for an ordinary mortal, like him, except that he wants to reject the notion, an invention allegedly coming from the opposition?

At some point in the past, Duterte had

signified he wanted out of it. Fatigue, after all, is part of the human lot. Even the strongest get tired, Nietzsche said. Duterte has been there, done that. If he had known beforehand, he would not probably have gone this far.

But he got his genie out of the bottle. And the genie did not tell him that every president, whether minority or majority, is meant or destined to face a crisis, sooner or later.

Duterte's experience is unprecedented. Even before he won, the South China Sea dispute with China was already looming large ahead of his ascent to power. He knew what was coming and, forthwith, issued a bravado of a statement that he would take jet ski to the disputed territories to assert Philippine rights over them.

It didn't happen. Of course, he was misunderstood or he was just being lightheaded.

Taal volcano later erupted, and Duterte threatened to dumped bodily urea into the volcano's crater. It's a good thing the deadly volcano stopped spewing lava. The Covid 19 virus had alarmed some people the first time it signaled it could turn into a health nightmare. The mayor from the South warned that he would slap it away.

The interest of netizens in Duterte's "invisibility" during important meetings for the nation is more than an instinctive curiosity or scoring political points. *It's a zero-sum game. His no reelectionist.* Given his dispositive, dismissive attitudes in the past, many may be just wondering now, nearly four and a half years gone in his term, whether he's really serious about the highest job in the land his betters dreamed of and still do.

No less than Sen. Richard Gordon, a 'dreamers' club member, whose Philippine Red Cross Duterte mocked as "mukhang pera", doubts the President's seriousness even in his avowed campaign against corruption in government.

Gordon says it seems to him the effort is more slogan than anything.

In the aftermath of three destructive storms, the President has created another task force to look after the rehabilitation of badly affected areas. That's on top of other task forces like the one on the pandemic and the one on government corruption. More delegations, more potential out-of-sight engagements. More money from where there is less even for a much-needed vaccine.

Give Gordon the benefit of intelligence as well as experience. The Covid 19 threat is still around as people appear to have learned to live with or die with it. He should know whereof he speaks. He's on top of the biggest COVID testing agency in the land. He chairs the blue ribbon committee in the Senate. No "big fish" has yet been caught in the corruption campaign, with some potential "big fish" being ruled out right off the bat.

Will many Filipinos heed Roque's advise to stop yearning for their President's presence, or perhaps get used to seeing less and less of him, in the remaining part of his term and simply wait out for the new one who will fit the bill?

# CSF inaugurates state-of-the-art C3

Lending a strong IT presence at the event were top telco honchos Dennis A Uy, founder-CEO of Converge ICT Solutions, Inc. and Dennis Magbatoc, assistant vice president of PLDT Enterprise.

Welcoming the guests were Vice Mayor Jimmy T. Lazatin, members of the city council, and chief of offices.

Located at the City Civic Center in Barangay San Isidro, C3 is a two-storey facility with a 973.46 square meter area.

Its main feature is the Operation Center equipped with an LED display billboard for fast-

er response during emergencies. This allows the sharing and monitoring of recorded clips from the 110 bullet cameras and 16 PTZ (pan, tilt, zoom) cameras mounted in strategic areas around the city, particularly the principal thoroughfares of MacArthur Highway, Jose Abad Santos Avenue, Dolores and Lazatin junctions.

“We now have eyes that are watching the situation of the city all day and all night. We deployed personnel here that are highly-trained to be alert and conscious of everything that they can monitor on their screens,” enthused Santiago.

The center is manned

24/7 by trained personnel from different rescue and security departments in the city headed by Raymond Del Rosario, city disaster risk reduction management officer.

To ensure data and information transmission even on telecom blind spots, a communication tower was installed at the site.

A media room is also provided inside the C3 for smoother and convenient coordination when significant instructions or alerts need to be relayed.

“The construction and opening of C3 was actually delayed because the Civic Center became an isolation facility for our

Covid-19 patients but I pushed for it to be finished this year because this is really necessary for the peace and order and disaster response of the city,” Santiago said. He noted how C3 was tested by Typhoon Ulysses and “I can really say that we did not have a hard time in the monitoring and other operations.”

**Last building standing**

Santiago sees C3 as the “last building standing” in the city, firmly confident of its solid foundation and efficient structural design.

Strategically located at the geographical center of San Fernando, C3 has very low susceptibility

ty to flooding. Its foundations are made of steel I-beams making it resistant to earthquake and liquefaction.

The P220-million fund for the project, according to Santiago, came from savings of the city government and assistance from business sector stakeholders.

The project, he said, was born of his belief that “investing in the protection and safety of the constituency is essential

in attaining a sense of confidence and pride among Fernandinos.”

# Pogi piqued, urges probe on barangay...

This, in the wake of a disclosure to the city government of a “concerned citizen” that Barangay Malabantias officials referred 12 suspected Covid-19 patients to the Jongno East Medical Center Inc. located in Mabini Sreet, Friendship Highway of the same village for swab testing, each costing P6,500.

While DOH-licensed as “infirmary hospital,” Jongno East Medical Center Inc. is not authorized to conduct community RT-PCR Test or swab testing, it was learned.

According to the concerned citizen, a family allegedly reported to Barangay Malabantias officials that they were exposed to a relative, who was confirmed to be Covid-19 positive.

The barangay allegedly sent a purok leader named “Noel”

to the house of the exposed family who then told them that “the city government is not offering free swab test.”

In an interview, a member of the family told city health officer Dr. Verona Gueverra that Noli told them: “Walang libre ang Angeles City government” and that they “need to pay P6,500” per test.

The family allegedly coordinated with a certain “Maricris” from Barangay Malabantias, who referred them to the Jongno East Medical Center Inc.

The said referrals were in clear violation of the city government’s protocol for suspected Covid-19 patients, said Guevarra.

Under the protocol, the barangay council, through their health workers should coordinate with the CHO once their constituent/s manifests Covid-19 symp-

toms, or have close contact with positive patients.

CHO through the help of barangay health emergency response team will conduct contact tracing.

It is the city government that will determine who will be quarantined or those who will be subjected to RT-PCR test, stressed Guevarra. Swab testing is shouldered by the city government.

Upon learning of the said report, Lazatin immediately formed a team composed of members of the Angeles City Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Office, CHO, and the Angeles City Police Office, to be led by his chief adviser director IC Calaguas and Executive Assistant IV Reina Manuel to confirm the veracity of the reports.

The team immediately went to the house of

the exposed family, who were then being prepared for PCR Testing by the staff of Jongno East Medical Center Inc.

Lazatin immediately reported to DOH the illegal community RT-PCR test being conducted by Jongno East Medical Center Inc.

In view of this, the mayor issued a stern warning to all officials of the 33 barangays to refrain from making referrals to private centers, and abide by the safety and health protocols set by the city government.

He said he will not tolerate any unlawful activity in the city, especially by officials who are supposed to be the first to implement and follow protocols.

“Hindi po natin i-to-tolerate ang anumang panloloko sa aking mga kababayan, lalo na ngayong panahon ng pandemya,” Lazatin furthered.

pected Covid-19 cases to a private medical center in the city.

“Ang allegation nila is profiteering of (sic) the barangay officials. Sa amin po ay malinaw na political harassment ito. Ang dami na ng pagdedemanda ng Mayor na nag-umpisa sa basura, sa SAP, this is political harassment,” said Gueco.

On Sunday, the city information office press released that Mayor Carmelo “Pogi” Lazatin, Jr. had asked the Department of Health, the Department of the Interior and Local Government, and the city council to conduct a full-blown investigation on alleged referrals of suspected Covid-19 cases by barangay officials to a clinic not licensed to conduct community swab testing.

Gueco had a different take of the circum-

stances that led to the mayor’s action.

“Saturday, when I went home around 7 p.m. napansin ko maraming tao sa may Plaridel so I called the barangay official, purok leader Noel Borabien, and asked what happened, bakit maraming pulis diyan, bakit maraming tao,” he shared.

“Ang sabi nila sa akin, yung ka-barrio namin humingi ng tulong. Ang sabi nila pinatingin nila sa doctor sa San Rafael (Medical Center) ang anak nya and they found out positive siya sa Covid. Tinatanong ng nanay ng Covid patient ang pangako ng San Rafael na kukunin sila ng LGU ng Angeles dahil tatlong araw na hindi pa daw sila kinukuha,” furthered the barangay chair.

According to Gueco, the mother was told to wait for San Rafael to coordinate with the LGU but the mother kept in-

sisting to look for a private swab testing center immediately as she had been waiting for three days already to supposedly be transported by the LGU from San Rafael hoping to be taken under its care.

Gueco said his wife Maricris helped the mother of the Covid-positive patient as they wanted to get tested for Covid immediately at a private swabbing center that offered a cheaper price.

“Naghahanap sila ng private swab testing center. Namamahalan sila sa P6,500 kaya ang ginawa ni Maricris ay nakiusap at humingi ng discount sa Jongno kaya ginawang P5,700 na lang,” said Gueco.

The said swabbing center is the Jongno East Medical Center Inc. from which Maricris asked for a discount on behalf of the mother.

“Humingi sila ng tulong, syempre tutulun-

gan natin sila. Discount ‘yon, nasaan ang commission doon?” asked Gueco.

“This is character assassination and trial by publicity. If there is a probable cause because it is in flagrante delicto, bakit hindi ipinakulong? Pinalabas ang mga workers ng clinic, si Maricris hindi man ipinatawag. Bakit kailangan ng full-blown investigation eh hawak na nga kagabi,” he added.

“I challenge them to show the video footage while the Mayor and Ms. IC are interrogating the owner (of the hospital),” he dared.

Punto! tried to get the statement of Jongno East Medical Center to clarify their side of the issue. However, a woman representative of Jongno, who refused to be named, said they will release a statement as soon as they are able to talk to their lawyers.

pected Covid-19 patients to a private clinic not licensed to conduct swab tests.

"This is a clear mockery of the rules and regulations set by the city, as well as the national government. Ignorance of the law excuses no one," Bonifacio, also the chairman of the blue ribbon committee, reiterated.

This, after photos circulated on social media showing a barangay assembly conducted for the State of the Barangay Address (SOBA), where 150 individuals, mostly barangay officials, were gathered in a covered court in the mentioned village.

Most of them were caught on cam not wearing facemasks and face shields, and even not observing social distancing. They even conducted a 'Question and Answer' portion, without wearing facemasks or face shields.

"Paano natin mapapasunod ang mga kapwa natin Angelenos, kung mga opisyales natin mismo ang nangunguna sa paglabag sa mga regulasyon ng pamahalaan," Bonifacio, also chairman of the committee on trade and commerce, said.

The city will not be lenient in investigating the said allegations against these barangay officials, according to Bonifacio.

As a doctor and a city government official, Bonifacio shared he was offended by this display of ignorance, disrespect, and selfishness by public servants who are supposed to lead by example. As such, the efforts of frontliners and health workers are being wasted.

"Pagod na pagod na ang ating mga frontliners at health workers. Halos hindi na sila matulog, makapagsilbi lang sa bayan. Are those sleepless nights and endless sacrifices just for

nothing? Hindi na nga sila makauwi sa mga pamilya nila," Bonifacio lamented.

City Ordinance No. 546, Section III (h) states that "all persons are mandated to properly wear facemasks in public," while (i) explains the "strict prohibition of social/mass gatherings, including parties, especially in public establishments.

The photos also showed that the meals were served buffet style, which is also a direct violation under the city protocols, in accordance to the protocols set by the Inter-Agency Task Force on Emerging Infectious Diseases.

According to business permit and licensing division chief Evangeline Malonzo, the city is regulating catering services since social gatherings, particularly parties, are still strictly prohibited under Resolution No. 6, which regulates the conduct of so-

cial gatherings and/or public events during the holiday season.

The circulated photos also showed several senior citizens in attendance, which is also an infraction of the city's MGCQ guidelines which states that "any person below 21, and those who are 60 and above, shall be required to remain in their residences at all times, except when indispensable under the circumstances for obtaining essential goods and services and for work in industries and offices or such other activities permitted."

Aside from these alleged violations, reports of officials profiteering from illegal swab referrals surfaced, prompting Mayor Carmelo "Pogi" Lazatin, Jr. to request a full-blown investigation by the city council, Department of the Interior and Local Government, and Department of Health.

ibility as an investment strategy in dealing with locators without detri-

ment to the government.

"Bayanihan also means helping (CIAC investors) so they may promptly recover and

help the government in its landside business development projects that will readily create revenue sources," Aquino said.


In July, CIAC imposed a deferred collection of lease rentals and granted locators a 30-day grace period from the last due date of their rental payments.

Aquino noted that some locators of CIAC wish to extend lease agreements or are looking for a middle ground on rental issues or extension in the period of payments.

"We're going to extend lease agreements (of locators) on a case-to-case basis so hopefully this move will serve as springboards for them to recover from the sudden business disruption and income loss," Aquino added.

The Clark Civil Aviation Complex managed by CIAC is home to the privately-run Clark International Airport, as well as the mixed-use business district Clark Global City, and currently around 45 locators in cargo and aviation-related businesses. —CIAC-CCO

AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING THE ANGELES CITY COFFEE PROCESSING CENTER AT THE CITY COLLEGE OF ANGELES, PAMPANG, ANGELES CITY.

WHEREAS, the City of Angeles recognizes that there is a need to boost the coffee industry in Angeles City;

WHEREAS, that there is a need to develop, enhance and promote the coffee industry as an income source of farmers and increase farm productivity for sustainable development;

WHEREAS, one of such programs is by establishing a proper coffee processing facility complete with production equipment to ensure that coffee produce/manufacture their products in accordance to the standards set by the Food and Drugs Administration (FDA) and providing for its marketing and promotions.

NOW THEREFORE, be it ordained as it is hereby ordained by the Sangguniang Panlungsod in session assembled:

Section 1. Title. This Ordinance shall be known as the “Establishment of the Angeles City Coffee Processing Center”

Section 2. Establishment of the Angeles City Coffee Processing Center. There shall be established a processing facility complete with production equipment in Angeles City to be known as the “Angeles City Coffee Processing Center”

Section 3. Implementing Component. The Office of the City Mayor through the Office of the Executive Assistant IV is hereby tasked in the implementation of this ordinance.

Section 4. Management of the Coffee Processing Center. The Coffee Processing Center shall be managed by the Office of the City Mayor through the Office of the Executive Assistant IV in coordination with the Angeles City Economic Development and Investment Promotions Office (ACEDIPO)

Section 5. Organization and Responsibilities. In accordance with Food and Drugs Administration (FDA) Administrative Order No. 153, Series of 2004, the Coffee Processing Center shall have the following personnel:

a. Production Head;

b. Quality Control Head/Quality Assurance Head;

c. Food Safety Compliance Officer;

d. Production Staff

- raw materials warehouse staff

- depulper operator

- grinder operator

- batching staff

- packaging staff

- finish goods warehouse staff

5.1. Personnel stated above shall coordinate properly with the management of the City College of Angeles specifically on matters of securing the properties and maintenance of cleanliness of the said facility.

5.2. The above stated personnel shall be under the Office of the City Mayor, specifically for purposes of identifying their salaries and other benefits.

Section 6. Duties and Functions.

a. Production Head

a.1. Shall ensure the smooth daily operations of the processing center;

a.2. Shall see to it that the standards for good manufacturing services, proper hygiene and food safety are always met;

a.3. Shall assess project and resource equipment.

b. Quality Control Head/Quality Assurance Head

b.1. Shall monitor operations to ensure that they meet production standards;

b.2. Shall recommend adjustments to the assembly or production process;

b.3. Shall inspect, test, or measure materials or products being produce;

b.4. Accept or reject finished items.

c. Food Safety Compliance Officer

c.1. Shall implement, oversee and follow up on all sanitation standards and procedures;

c.2. Shall be responsible for ensuring food service equipment is secure and maintained in proper order;

c.3. Shall prepare weekly schedules and schedule additional personnel as needed;

c.4. Shall maintain control over inventory of equipment, packaging materials, etc.

d. Production Staff (at least six personnel)

- raw materials warehouse staff

- depulper operator

- dryer operator

- batching staff

- roaster operator

- grinder operator

- packaging staff

- finish goods warehouse staff

- maintenance staff

Section 7. Operating Schedule of the Coffee Processing Center.

a. The production facility shall open with the following schedule

Mondays to Fridays – 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M.

Saturdays – 10:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M.

7.1 Above schedule on operating hours will be subjected to change depending on the volume of production and which season of the year.

Section 8. Repealing Clause. This Ordinance repeals any city ordinance, resolution, and other issuances inconsistent herewith.

Section 9. Effectivity. This Ordinance shall take effect upon its approval and publication in a newspaper of local circulation.

# AC gov't promotes 'Gawang Angeleños' with OTOP kiosks

Angeles City Economic Development and Investment Promotions Office Head Irish Bonus-Llego is encouraging all Angeleños to support the locally made products featured in OTOP by visiting the kiosks and the physical store at Barangay Sto. Rosario, near the Museo ning Angeles, and checking out its online platform on Shopee and Facebook (@OTOP Angeles).

Llego added that apart from this initiative, the OTOP store will also be holding a 12.12 sale starting December 1 to 12, 2020.

# 24 Aetas graduate from TESDA

BALANGA CITY -- The Technical Education and Skills Development Authority provincial office here announced Monday that 24 members of the Aeta tribe in Dinalupihan, Bataan graduated from a TESDA course.

TESDA provincial director Julie Ann Banganan said that more women natives joined the training with 22 of them and only two men.

The Aetas, belonging to the Ambala Tribe in Barangay Bayan-Bayanan, finished the course on Plant Crops (leading to Agricultural Crops Production NC-II) at the D’ Planners Training Center.

They were TESDA scholars under the Special Training Employment Program, funded by Bataan 1<sup>st</sup> District Rep. Geraldine Roman, Banganan said.

Roman, graduation guest speaker, said that she was glad that they were able to provide skills training and upgrading to the Aeta group in Dinalupihan.

She said that trainees need not go to TESDA centers but were trained right in their respective communities. “We aimed to provide them with skills when it comes to innovative and effective planting methods, and we brought it through this scholarship program,” the congresswoman said.

Roman noted that more women

joined the training and were excited to plant and learn how to grow their crops. She expressed the hope that this course will be productive and help more indigenous people.

Lawyer Tony Boy Roman accompanied his sister Geraldine.

Maj. Gen. Jesus Fajardo, AFP (Ret), TESDA 3 regional director, thanked Roman for choosing the Aetas to be some of her scholars through TESDA Bataan.

He said that the scholars were provided free training , one-year accident insurance, internet and health and personal protective equipment allowance and daily allowance.

Fajardo said the training of the natives was consonant to the agency’s new slogan “TESDA Abot Lahat” created by Secretary Isidro Lapena, TESDA director-general, of reaching out to people even in remote areas.

He thanked Dinalupihan Mayor Maria Angela Garcia and Vice-Mayor Renato Matawaran for helping the IPs.

TESDA deputy director general for partnerships and linkages Aniceto “John” Bertiz III, who served as one of the guest speakers, said that the agency pursues its mandate on the provision of quality education and training through the “Kaalam, Kakayahan at Kabuhayan” projects.
