

(L biz groups back transfer of turboprop flights to CRK

CLARK FREEPORT – Business groups all over Central Luzon expressed strong support to the transfer of turboprop flights to the Clark International Airport and other alternative airports to decongest the Ninoy Aquino International Airport.

A joint resolution of the Clark Investors and Locators Association, Subic Bay Freeport Chamber of Commerce, American Chamber of Commerce North Luzon, Freeport of Bataan Investors and Locators Association, Philippine Chamber of Commerce and Industry-Tarlac, Metro Clark ICT Council, Metro Angeles Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Hotel and Restaurant Association in Pampanga, and the Pampanga Chamber of Commerce and Industry said the transfer of interisland flights to CRK "would create more direct connections to Regions 1, 2, 3 and the CARR, making travel more accessible and affordable to about 23 million people from these regions as well as the 7 million people from the northern part of the National Capital Region."

"Air transport creates employment, facilitates trade, enables tourism and supports sustainable development, thus, playing a vital role in facilitating economic growth, especially for developing countries," the resolution said.

It noted that "NAIA has recently attained a record high of 50.1 million passengers in 2024, way beyond its current passenger capacity of 35 million passengers per year."

Congestion at the NAIA was "presenting significant challenges to passenger experience and overall efficiency," it added.

Passenger traffic at NAIA is expected to register a passenger volume growth of about 20% to 30% this year equivalent to its planned capacity of 60 million passengers per year that is scheduled to be achieved after another

4 to 5 years.

"One of the measures that can be taken to increase passenger capacity significantly and expediently at NAIA is to transfer all turbo-prop flights to secondary airports giving way to jet planes that have four times more air seats per craft than turbo-prop planes and can increase hourly aircraft movements from the present 30-40 to about 488," the resolution suggested.

It furthered that the transfer of turboprop flights to alternative airports will not only decongest NAIA "but also allow it to meet projected growth in passenger traffic in a more expedient manner thereby mitigating challenges such as frequent delays, crowded terminals, and compromised service quality."

"It would free up valuable runway slots that would allow NAIA to accommodate more larger, long-haul aircraft that require shorter dis-

tances between planes in the same route, reducing runway congestion and minimizing delays," it added.

"Redistributing turboprop flights to alternative airports such as the Clark International Airport or the Sangley Point Airport with underutilized capacities will improve the overall absorptive capacity of the country for international as well as domestic flights and catalyze economic growth in their respective sphere of operations," the resolution noted.

The Manila Slot Coordination Committee, composed of the Department of Transportation, Manila International Airport Authority, Civil Aviation

Authority of the Philippines, Civil Aeronautics Board and the New NAIA Infrastructure Corp., the San Miguel Corp.-led operator of NAIA issued a resolution issued last December that carriers must transfer 30% of their turboprop operations out of NAIA starting March 30, 2025.

Product dev't ongoing to boost Zambales mango industry

IBA, ZAMBALES — While tourism stakeholders in Zambales prepare for this year's iteration of the annual Dinamulag Mango Festival, the provincial government is preoccupied on another level in the task of improving production to sustain the local mango industry.

Gov. Hermogenes Ebdane Jr. said on Monday the provincial government's flagship program to revitalize the Zambales mango industry is now on its second phase, setting the rehabilitation and rejuvenation of some 20,800 mango trees in the province at a cost of P40 million.

This four-year phase, from 2025 to 2028, comprises the bulk of the P50-million Zambales Mango Green Valley Project launched last year to increase mango production

yield, encourage farm owners and contractors to adopt modern farm technologies, and promote good agricultural practices for long-term sustainability and profitability


ability and profitability.
Ebdane said that after Phase
1, which established modern
mango production areas
to serve as demo farms for
modern mango production technology, Phase 2 now focuses on
rehabilitating existing carabao
mango trees through improved
farm management, fertilization,
and irrigation techniques.

A key component in this stage, the governor explained, is capacity-building and training, which shall be undertaken in collaboration with the President Ramon Magsaysay State University (PRMSU) and the Samahan ng Magmamangga ng Zambales (SMZ).

"HOWEVER, while I recognize the noble intention of the authors, I cannot ignore the concerns regarding the declaration's lack of historical basis, the absence of a thorough study that shows key performance indicators for such designation, and the possibility that the bill may offend sensibilities in other provinces that are equally proud of their culinary contributions.'

Thus, President Marcos Jr. vetoed the proposal declaring Pampanga as the culinary capital of the Philippines which, understandably, did not sit well with cabalens mighty proud of their culinary

Instead of weighing in on the reasons the president proffered for his veto, netizens chewed Marcos Jr. for a number of non-sequiturs, ranging from the ultra malicious allegation of his loss of his gustatory sense due to..., to the "hatred" of the Kapampangan by Marcos Sr. dating back to the bitter rivalry with Apung Dadong Macapagal in the 1960s yet.

There were even calls for a zero vote for the administration's senatorial slate this Mav.

A light of wisdom on the president's veto shone in asocial media post of secretary general of the UNESCO National Commission Ivan Henares, himself a Kapampangan of note, thus:

"It is not saying that Kapampangan cuisine is not good. It just acknowledges that in a nation as diverse as ours, no one region can claim to have the best food. What I've realized from travelling the country is that our diversity is our strength.

"We should not be competing with each other for bragging rights and empty titles. Focus on sustainable programs, not just trivial things. Let's determine 'key performance indicators' and work towards those. That goal is best encapsulated by Chef Jam Melchor, 'ensuring a stronger, more sustainable future for Filipino food and the communities that bring it to life'."

I have no pretensions to prophecy or prescience but I have thought along parallel lines ten months ago at the time of the frenzied preparations for the culinary capital legislation, causing me to publish here – May 27, 2024 – this piece on the very subject. And for which, I too got some brickbats thrown my way, but nowhere near that dumped on the husband of Anne Curtis, the gastronome Erwann Heussaff for his feature on Kapampangan food cited in my article.

Culinary conceit redux

IS PAMPANGA the Culinary Capital of the Philippines?

How can it be otherwise? What with the sangguniang panlalawigan passing unanimously Ordinance No. 863 on Feb. 26, and Gov. "Delta" Dennis Pineda approving it on March 7, both this year, declaring the province as such "for so many reasons" not the least of which is Pampanga's "long uninterrupted reputation for being home to culinary talents – from the chefs who cooked for the Malolos Congress in 1898 to the chefs who prepared the meals for the athletes of the 30th Southeast Asian Games in 2019."

The ink on Delta's signature hadn't even dried yet when former President Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo led her three cabalen congressional cohorts in filing House Bill No. 10014 seeking the declaration of Pampanga as the "Culinary Capital of the Philippines" in recognition of the province's "formidable culinary history" and to further boost the province's thriving gastronomic tourism. Their proposed measure literally turning into a bill of fare with a banquet of the choicest Kapampangan dishes at the House, delectably digested by their peers.

Were legislation the only determinant to a culinary capital entitlement, then Pampanga is it most assuredly, its political leaders having jumped the gun on all other provinces in the country.

But is it? Is it even within the powers of Congress to legislate taste?

De gustibus non est disputandum. A truism I have kept from my seminary Latin that has withstood the test of time. Indeed, the selfevident truth that "about taste, there is no

In matters of gustation, I find as much predilection for the Kapampangan begukan as for the Bicol sinilihan, for the Ilocano dinakdakan as for the kinilaw de Oro and Dumaguete's binakhaw. Or for chicken, be it inasal, kulub, lechon or pinaupo. The gourmand in me couldn't care less of the origin of the food on-plate, all that matters is its tastiness. I leave anything above that to the snootiness of the gourmet.

Why, a taste of ambrosia to me may just be a cause of nausea to another. I suddenly remember the Bicolano journalist Ben Gamos who, despite working in Pampanga all his life, never found the "usual" Kapampangan food beyond plainly edible - "panlaman lang ng tiyan." Whenever ribbed of his proclivity for laing and Bicol express over sisig and tocino, he was wont to riposte: "Kanya-kanyang poor taste lang 'yan." Of course, the inference goes both ways. Yummy to one, yucky to the other.

Concededly, Pampanga is a culinary haven. Conceitedly, Pampanga is gustatory heaven. Just about everyone that has come to dine in a Kapampangan home – from the humblest hut to the grandest mansion, or in a Kapampangan eatery - from the lowliest carinderia to the classiest gourmet restaurant, attests to that indubitability. By and large.

Food, glorious food, has long defined Pampanga in the nation's cultural psyche, affirmed in one generation, reaffirmed in the next. So niched, shall it remain.

Still, does that make Pampanga the Culinary Capital of the Philippines, meriting national legislation at that?

Currently breaking the internet is Erwan Heussaff's FEATR on Kapampangan food. It is - to me - the most substantial take on our culinary excellence yet, seasoned, so to speak, with the perspicacity of contextualization by culturatus Ruston Banal and Jam Melchor, founder of the Philippine Culinary Heritage Movement. Every cabalen worth his palate ought to see, indeed, savor this cultural fare. It is a nourishment to the Kapampangan soul.

At the end of the video feature came the inevitable: Is Pampanga the Culinary Capital of the Philippines?

"A question that is impossible to answer. It's impossible to self-proclaim that [title] because ...there's such beautiful diversity when it comes to Filipino food to claim that one place only can represent the country as its culinary capital." Heussaff, definitive and succinct here.

And en punto: "It's very difficult to say. Yet, I do believe that [Pampanga] is one of the most important provinces that we have when it comes to food alongside provinces like Cebu or regions like Western Visayas."

Talking of Western Visayas, its regional apital Iloilo City was included last October in the UNESCO Creative Cities Network (UCCN) for Gastronomy, a "recognition granted to applicant cities for their culinary history, tradition, culture, and identity - which integrates education, science and technology, crafts and farming industries, and environmental endeavors that contributed to the sustainable gastronomic heritage."

Notwithstanding this recognition from no less than UNESCO itself, Iloilo City did not endeavor to be declared – by law – as the "Gastronomic Capital of the Philippines."

Might the gastronome Heussaff have had this at the back of his mind when he pondered the impossibility to the question: Is Pampanga the Culinary Capital of the Philippines?

The Philippines' first in the gastronomy category, Iloilo City joins in the prestigious recognition Baguio City as UCCN Creative City of Crafts and Folk Art since 2017, and Cebu City as the country's inaugural UCCN Creative City of Design in 2019.

Crafts. Folk art. Design. Realms of culture and innovation where Pampanga excels too, but unrecognized, alas!

No harm to Kapampangan pride there as a whole, only a prick on our culinary conceit.

Legacy of a martyr

ST. OSCAR Romero's theology and spirituality are rooted in a deep love for the Gospel, the Church, and especially the poor. His journey—from a cautious, conservative priest to a prophetic and courageous archbishop—reveals how faith can be transformed by reality, especially when confronted with injustice and suffering.

Romero's Theology: A Heart for the Poor and the Gospel

1. The Church of the Poor

Romero came to believe that the Church must take a clear stand with the poor—not just to care for them spiritually, but to denounce the systems that keep them poor. He said:

"The Church is not interested in political power, but it is interested in the people, and it cannot remain silent before injustice."

His commitment was not political in a partisan sense—it was deeply pastoral. He believed the Church must follow Jesus in loving, defending, and being with the poor.

2. Conversion Through Suffering

Romero's own theology was shaped by personal and national tragedy. The murder of his close friend, Jesuit priest Fr. Rutilio Grande, was a turning point. Romero, who had once been cautious, began to speak boldly. He said:

"When I looked at Rutilio lying there dead, I thought, 'If they have killed him for doing what he did, then I too have to walk the same path."

His faith deepened through witnessing the suffering of others. This led him to understand Christ as truly present in the crucified people of El Salvador.

3. The Cross as Central

For Romero, the Cross of Christ was not just

a symbol of suffering—it was a call to action. His spirituality was rooted in Jesus' solidarity with the suffering. He once said:

"A Church that does not provoke any crises, a Gospel that does not unsettle, a Word of God that does not get under anyone's skin—what Gospel is that?"

He believed the Gospel had to challenge injustice, even if it cost him his life.

4. Nonviolence and Forgiveness

Though he denounced military violence and economic oppression, Romero never called for armed resistance. He believed in the power of truth and nonviolence. His final homily, the day before he was killed, ended with:

"In the name of God, and in the name of this suffering people whose cries rise to heaven... I beg you, I implore you, I order you: Stop the repression!"

Legacy of a Martyr

Romero was declared a martyr of the faith, not because he was killed for politics, but because he was killed for living out the Gospel in defense of the poor and vulnerable. His canonization recognized that his fight for justice was not separate from his faith—but flowed from it.

Popularity over merit: flawed qualifications?

WHY DO you think our country is in its current position where many elected public officials are neither equipped to govern nor qualified to legislate?

Some of you would probably cite our collective failure to educate the Filipino voters. Others would blame it on propensity of those in power to perpetuate a culture of patronage so that as majority of our countrymen remains poor and uneducated, they will continue to beg for scraps and dole-outs.

Last Monday night, I was watching another engaging and insightful episode on the podcast "Usapang ED" hosted by Atty. Joseph Noel M. Estrada, one of the country's renowned education lawyers, and Ms. Doris Fernandez-Ferrer, the executive director of the Private Educational Assistance Committee.

During the discussion I raised a question whether the qualifications for running for public office—specifically for positions in the Senate and the House of Representatives—are shockingly basic compared to the qualifications and requirements for even the most entry-level jobs in other sectors.

According to the 1987 Constitution, to become a senator in the Philippines, a candidate must be a natural-

born Filipino citizen, at least 35 years old on the day of the election, able to read and write, a registered voter, and a resident of the Philippines for at least two years preceding the election.

For members of the House of Representatives, the requirements are even more lenient: a person must be a natural-born Filipino citizen, at least 25 years old on election day, able to read and write, a registered voter in their district (except for party-list representatives), and a resident of the country for at least one year preceding the election.

While the intent of the framers of our Constitution was clear and that is to foster a more democratic system where voters are given a wide array of choices that are not restricted by other qualifications such as educational attainment and relevant job experience, I believe that the current set of requirements has, to a large extent, contributed to a political system where wealth and popularity, not merit or competence, often determine who gets elected.

It is not surprising why many of us find it hard to understand this: if many job openings, even for positions that pay the minimum wage, require applicants to possess specific skills, education, and work experience, why then, are individuals who will have the power to enact laws, manage budgets, and shape national policy not held to a similar standard? As it is, the lack of rigorous requirements for political office opens the door for candidates who are driven more by financial resources and personal popularity than by the expertise necessary to serve effectively.

Sadly, this stark reality in the country today where wealth, popularity and family connections are often the determining factors in elections is something we have to accept and even endure unless we are

focus on voter education. Why? Because the people who have the ultimate power to determine the leaders who should govern them and give them long-term solutions and multi-dimensional programs to improve their lives, are the very same people who make the wrong choices every election cycle. Educating the Filipino voters does not start on the day they vote for the first time; it starts on the day and continues every single day that they make choices. It begins

right at home, and continues in the school and the larger community. If we are able to develop critical thinking among all learners and educate every Filipino voter, only the most qualified will be elected into power. Not even the basic P500 or the lucrative P5K "good will fee" per voter will be able to sway an informed choice.

Make no mistake, and do not get offended when we are told that we deserve the kind of government that we have now. As one TV ad aptly puts it, we are the product of the choices we make.

MaLu Project gains momentum in Pampanga

CITY OF SAN FERNANDO – A total of 17 schools in Pampanga have joined the growing movement for the promotion of environmental responsibility among students through the "Lunes Malinis" (MaLu) Project spearheaded by Eco Protect Management Corp. (EMPC).

EMPC CEO Alainne Tan announced plans to donate at least 50 more armchairs and garbage bins to schools in Pampanga, Bulacan, and other areas. For every 18 kilos of sachets collected, EMPC donates an armchair or a garbage bin.

Pampanga 1st District Rep. Carmelo "Jon" Lazatin II, who attended the launch of MaLu at Cuayan Elementary School on March 21, urged students and parents to cooperate with the project.

"Tulong-tulong laming po tayo, nakatulong na tayo sa gobyerno, sa pamahalaan natin, nakatulong na tayo sa eskwelahan at nakatulong pa tayo sa community. kinabukasan natin," Lazatin said.

For his part, Angeles City councilor Edu Pamintuan also praised the initiative. "Saksi ku pu na very effective ya pu [MaLu Project]. Importanti pu, ring pengari ampong deng anak mag cooperate la pu, misaup-saup tamu pu neh?"

To date, schools that joined the MaLu Project include San Fernando Elementary School, Gueco Balibago Elementary School, Sto. Domingo Integrated School, Sto. Rosario Elementary School, Anunas Elementary School, Pampang Elementary School, and Lourdes Northwest Elementary School.

Other participating schools are EPZA Resettlement Elementary School, North-Ville 15 Integrated School, Jose P. Dizon Elementary School Pandan, Abelardo Tinio Elementary School Capaya, Angeles Elementary School Pulung Bulu, Dr. Clemente N. Dayrit Elementary School, and Sapangbato Elementary School.



INVESTMENT HAVEN

No less than Special Assistant to the President for Investment and Economic Affairs Secretary Frederick Go cited CDC's role in the Philippines achieving a ₱1.9 trillion investment increase in 2024. "We'd just like to point out that the big three agencies that contributed to the performance last year are the Board of Investments, the Philippine Economic Zone Authority, and the Clark Development Corp."

The "best location for highly urbanized or highly commercialized forms of investment." So, the economic czar holds the Clark Freeport. So, indeed, in point of fact of expansion projects by existing locators and investments from new ones infused in 2024 and spread over phases in 2025.





Donggwang Clark Corp., a developer of tourism and leisure estates with additional ₱20 billion.

Taiwanese firm BB International Leisure and Resort Development Corp., a developer of integrated resort and water theme park facilities, with committed additional investment of ₱15 billion for the Midori Highlands, a new eco-friendly integrated township combining green spaces with urban living, including high-rise condominiums and a logistics center.

DeviceDesign Philippines Corp., a South Korean-based manufacturer specializing in wireless technology for the Internet of Things, investing ₱103 million.

Clark Water, a subsidiary of Manila Water Philippine Ventures and the sole water and wastewater service provider in the freeport, with ₱5.56 billion in capital expenditures for service improvement projects.

Yokohama Tire Philippines, Inc. with ₱3.5 billion to expand manufacturing operations set for completion by the end of 2025 with daily output capacity to reach 34,100 tires increasing to an annual output of 10 million tires by 2026.

Prodigy Maguire Concepts Inc., Nike's exclusive partner in the Philippines for the factory store format, is constructing a ₱134.5-million Nike Factory Store on a 2,500-square-meter site along M.A. Roxas Highway.

Inari Amerton, Inc., one of Malaysia's largest semiconductor firms, is expanding its operations with the construction of a new three-story, 2,000-square-meter building. Currently it employs some 2,000 individuals.

The Philippine Exporter Foundation Region III Inc. with

₱30.6 million in a lifestyle showroom and pasalubong center. Habibia Corp. with ₱22 million. JBW Floor Center Inc. with ₱5.8 million. Otonari Food OPC with ₱40 million.

All these contributing to the diverse business landscape driving the growth of the freeport, seen to add some 6,000 individuals to its workforce, boosting employment opportunities in the region.

Nationstar Development Corp. has broken ground for the ₱126.95-million

Filipino-led boutique hotel, The Henry Hotel-Clark, and a commercial complex.

Construction of the Philippines' first Wyndham Garden Hotel has also started. With a committed investment of ₱979 million, the facility will boast a 15-floor structure with 176 suite rooms, lifestyle amenities, and conference spaces tailored for meetings, incentives, conventions, and exhibits (MICE) events.



MICECON 2024

"Clark is first and foremost an investment destination, but after 30 years, it has transformed into something more," said PCEO Devanadera, referencing the spirit of RA 7227 (Bases Conversion and Development Act of 1992) that established the Clark Freeport as a "labor-intensive, export-oriented, aviation-driven manufacturing and investment haven" to spur the development of the areas contiguous to the former American military installation.

"We have all the reasons for people to come over. We have vast spaces, so what did we do? First, we grouped the industries according to their business nature, and we sold the idea of MICE to people not involved in MICE or tourism," she said as MICECon 2024 opened in July. Unarguably, that event of the year positioned Clark as a premier global destination for MICE events.

At the JCI World Congress 2024 in Taiwan, Clark was chosen to host the JCI World Congress 2026 where delegates from over 100 countries are expected, creating opportunities for young leaders to connect globally.

The CDC is supporting Vespa Club of the Philippines in organizing the Pilipinas Vespa Days this November 2025 and in their bid to host the 2027 World Vespa Days in Clark.

Members of the Philippine Association of Legitimate Service Contractors gathered for their 14th Philippine National Conference in November 2024, at the Hilton Clark Sun Valley Resort.

The Inner Wheel Clubs of the Philippines, Inc. convened for their 59th National Conference at Royce Hotel just this February.

In the MICE sector, Clark hosted 2,540 events with 364,000 attendees. Additionally, 138 major events attracted 444,000 attendees, highlighting Clark's prominence as

A problem of ease in mobility invariably arises with the heavy volume of people coming to Clark events. As part of the solution, CDC introduced last September the Clark Loop, the first cashless payment bus transportation system in both a freeport zone and Central Luzon, setting a new standard for regional connectivity and efficiency.

VENUE FOR ARTS, CULTURE EVENTS

Post-pandemic, read: Devanadera time, the richness of local art and culture flourished at the Clark Freeport. The Clark Museum became a gallery of continuing art exhibitions by various Kapampangan artist groups in

Only this January, there was the "Kalilukan Culiat: Pisamban Maragul" featuring the works of 27 visual artists, including meticulously designed 3D models reimagining the Holy Rosary Parish Church.

Last December, "Paskung Kapampangan," showcased 21 works by visual storyteller Gerald Gloton highlighting the Pampanga's renowned lantern-making heritage and festive celebrations.

In November, the freeport hosted the travelling Vespa Museum Exhibition that featured 40 iconic Vespa models. vintage designs, and collectibles that highlight the enduring appeal of the Italian scooter brand.



MUSEUM CAPITAL

The Clark Museum will not remain for long all by its lonesome at the freeport.

On July 23, construction commenced for the Philippines' first motor racing museum, the Clark Tony's Motorsport Museum, sited adjacent to the Clark International Speedway. A project of Kilton Motor Corp., Pilipinas Shell, and Bermaz Auto Philippines Inc. (Mazda Phil.), the museum will feature racing bikes and motorcycles, Formula cars, racing cars, and go-karts. In addition, it will include a 1,200-square-meter conference hall for exhibitions, product launches, and private events, complete with a stage and dressing rooms.

Grander yet – in PCEO Devanadera's words "one of the grandest things that will happen in Clark" – is the National Museum of the Philippines, now in advanced state of construction at the ruins of the former Clark Air Base Hospital.

NMP-Clark will feature exhibitions on local history, art, culture, natural history, anthropology, and archaeology. It will also serve as an off-site location for NMP's central office and national collection repositories, among other functions.

TOP TOURISM DESTINATION

Twice in a row, Clark has been named the top tourist destination at the annual Department of Tourism-Region 3's Tourism Recognition for Enterprises and Stakeholders (TRES) Awards.

CDC was awarded the title of Filipino Brand of Service Excellence advocate, Most Creative Tourism Marketing Collateral – Social Media in the Province and Freeport Zone Category, and Most Creative Tourism Marketing Collateral - Printed (Brochure) in the Province and Freeport Zone Category.

The freeport's tourism sector has seen growth over the past three years. Visitor arrivals increased from 30 million in 2022 to 32.5 million in 2023, and further surged to 34.8 million in 2024. This includes 1.37 million overnight tourists, 1.44 million same-day visitors, and 1.21 million airport arrivals. Shopping malls in Clark attracted 30.78 million visitors, contributing to a robust domestic and international tourism presence.

Tourists spent an estimated ₱28.7 billion in 2024, based on an average daily expenditure of ₱9,147.58 and an average length of stay of 2.3 nights. Major hotels in Clark maintained an average occupancy rate of 77.92%, indicating strong demand for accommodation.



SPORTS TOURISM

At the 6th Philippine Sports Tourism Awards (PSTA) held in Cebu in November, Clark Freeport was elevated to its hall of fame, the first to be given that recognition.

Clark was cited for its consistent and multiple wins as Sports Tourism Destination of the Year in 2015, 2018, 2019, 2020, and 2021, highlighting the freeport's excellence in hosting premier sporting events that drive tourism and economic growth.

Major international and local sports events, including the Southeast Asian Games, triathlons, and marathons were among those held at then freeport which averages 100 events annually, drawing approximately 250,000 participants and visitors.

The Clark International Festival of Speed featuring an auto bazaar and outdoor exhibits on the latest in automotive innovation was held at the Clark International Speedway in October and November.

Over 150 football teams from across the country and international teams from Guam gathered at the Clark Parade Grounds for the Philippines Cup 2024 Football Tournament in December.


Only this March 16, the annual run-bike-run Clark Duathlon Classic had its 6th iteration, drawing some 400 athletes.

CULINARY HEARTLAND

Clark is fast emerging as the very heartland of the unlegislated culinary capital of the Philippines that is Pampanga. Beyond the dulang of regional fare, the freeport offers a banquet of international dishes.

Hotels as well as stand-alone restaurants have their own shares of go-to cuisines, from Chinese to Italian, Japanese to American, Korean to Indian, and delectably, all in-between. But there's no stopping the cornucopia of gustation in Clark.

New entrées in the smorgasbord of gastronomic delights are Couscousi Mediterranean Grill, the first of its kind in the freeport, and Rare Bar & Grill at the Quest+ Conference Center Clark offering the best steaks and dry-aged meats paired with handcrafted cocktails, and



Huwon by Kiwa at Royce Hotel poised to be a top-tier choice for fine Korean dining.

Coming soon are Sayam House homestyle Thai cooking, a food court and café, and, unarguably, the most wished-for Mario's Restaurant, famed for its 50 years of culinary excellence.

SUSTAINABILITY

"It's all about people. It's all about getting connected. It's all about continuity and making the Philippines the best source of manpower."

PCEO Devanadera defining the rationale of CDC entering into partnerships with higher institutions of learning to as far as the Visayas and Mindanao.

"Our people are our wealth. Your students are valuable assets to investors. We can continue to attract more investors because we have a workforce that is English-speaking, young, creative, and innovative. So, we look forward to having you, and welcome to Clark," enthused the CDC chief.

Among the HILs the CDC has entered into MOAs with for its Clark Ambassador Program are the University of Mindanao; St. Paul University-Iloilo, Central Philippine University, and Visayas Aerospace College and Technology, all in Iloilo; Jose C. Feliciano College Foundation and University of the Assumption, both in Pampanga.

CDC is also synergizing aviation industry-academe collaboration through MOAs

with CAAP-approved Training Organizations (ATO), enhancing collaboration among government, academe, and the private sector to ensure educational curricula align with the aviation industry's manpower needs.

Participating ATOs include DPR Aviation College, FDSA Aviation College of Science and Technology Inc., Jocson College Inc., and Masters Aviation Academy Inc.

PCEO Devanadera also led discussions with Southern Luzon State University- College of Engineering and SIA Engineering (Phil.) for internship opportunities for engineering students.

SCWELA PROGRAM

"This will carry you through. Your career in CDC may have started, but it will truly take off when you have the right qualifications."

Thus, the CDC chief exhorted the first batch of CDC employees enrolled



undergraduate CDC employees with opportunities to continue their education and enhance their professional growth. Flexible class schedules help scholars balance academic commitments with work responsibilities.

RA 7227 REDUX

"In short, the Clark metropolis has what it takes to be a Mecca for tourists, a magnet of investments, and a market of goods and services. We must leverage these attributes into higher visitor traffic, attracting more investments that generate better jobs and spur economic activity."

President Ferdinand R. Marcos Jr. there affirmed the vision set forth for Clark by RA 7227 during a site inspection in July 2023 of the Clark Multi-Specialty Medical Center (CMSMC) undergoing construction on a 5.7-hectare property in the freeport. The CMSMC is envisioned to be a world-

Marcos Jr. did not expressly mention the CMSMC is in effect an accomplished part of the mission set forth in RA 7227 – the promotion of the well-being of the communities contiguous to Clark.

What he said was broader in scope and scale: "I am happy that the province of Pampanga and Region III will again have this additional medical facility. It will also cater to patients not only from Region III but Regions I, II, and Metro Manila for the specialties in the heart, kidney, cancer, and pediatric ailments."

"We must acknowledge the part played by PAGCOR and the Clark Development Corp. as they had spearheaded the efforts in coordination with the Department of Health, the provincial government of Pampanga, and other partners to construct this facility," said the president, giving special mention to Vice Gov. Lilia "Nanay" Pineda for her persistence in pursuing the CMSPC to its fruition.

MADE IN CLARK

On September 4, CDC hosted the inaugural Clark Business Interdependence Conference to promote collaboration among freeport locators and drive economic growth within the zone. It was a most auspicious occasion for the launch of "Made in Clark," a certification by the Intellectual Property Office of the Philippines, solidifying the Clark Freeport's brand identity in the global market.

Enthused PCEO Devanadera: "And so, we were saying that when you are given the brand of Made in Clark Philippines, we have to make sure that you are up to quality. Made in Clark Philippines stands for excellence, and by upholding this standard, we elevate not just Clark, but the entire Philippines."

Registered under IPOPHL's 2023 Revised Trademark Regulations, the certification ensures the authenticity and quality of products manufactured within the freeport, effective as of Oct. 21, 2024, valid for 10 years until 2034.

Significant as it is, Made in Clark is more than a certification, it is a testament to the verity of the CDC chief's message in the said conference, to wit:

"The true strength of Clark lies not just in its diversity of industries but in how these industries can collaborate, support, and elevate one another. This is the essence of business interdependence." Not without a catalyst though, that is the CDC president

the City of San Fernando; Seminar on Wealth Succession Planning and Tax Management; and the EmpowerEd Financial Literacy Project in collaboration with the BSP extended to business and finance students in a series of fora at the City College of San Fernando, Pampanga State Agricultural University, Mary the Queen College, and the City College of Angeles.

BOF is likewise into collaboration and knowledge-sharing within the rural banking community, as exemplified in its On-Site Learning Program at its corporate center for the Rural Bank of Solano (Nueva Vizcaya) and partnerships with the Bicol Federation of Rural Banks and the Rural Bankers Association of the Philippines (RBAP), affirming BOF's leading role in industry-wide capacity building. In 2023, RBAP recognized BOF as a Pioneer On-Site Learning Bank for Corporate

Governance and Succession Planning and MSME Lending.

BOF's strong engagement with the BSP in hosting the Know Your Money seminar on the first Philippine Polymer



Banknote Series BSP and in the BSP Piso Caravan Program aimed at facilitating public access to exchanging unfit and damaged money to ensure only fit currency remains in circulation led to BOF being the first in Central Luzon to have a Currency Exchange Center as part of its regular services in its different branches.

Of its 22 branches, all but two – in Bulacan and Tarlac - are located in Pampanga with its flagship branch, the 22nd, inaugurated in June 3023 along Jose Abad Santos Avenue in the City of San Fernando, the regional and financial capital of

Central Luzon.

Like all other businesses, BOF was not spared from the economic doldrums wrought by the Covid-19 pandemic. It's aftermath however made a totally different story for BOF, best told in its expansion - San Jose, Floridablanca and the flagship branches both in 2023, and renovation – of its branches in Mabalacat City in 2022, and in Lubao, Poblacion-Floridablanca, Sto. Tomas, and Porac Sto. Tomas in 2024.

For the record: As of Dec. 31, 2024, BOF has P5.93 billion in total assets; P990 million in total capital; P4.56 billion in total deposits; and P4.25 billion in total gross loans. BOF ranks among the Top 10 rural banks in Central Luzon and in the Philippines.

Cardiovascular Center pediatric and adult cardiology, neurovascular and peripheral vascular catheterization, and interventional radiology; Breast Center; Liver and Pancreas Center; Center for Minimally Invasive Surgery; Chemo-Infusion Unit; Pain Clinic, Center for Integrative Medicine; Genomics; Nuclear Medicine and Molecular Imaging Center; Diabetes and **Nutrition Management** Services Center; Occupational Health Center; and Wellness Center all with state-of-the-art equipment.

And more came in 2024: TMC-Clark established the first Allergy and Immunology Center in Central Luzon, expanded its Hemodialysis Center from 6 to 14 chairs, and procured its second magnetic resonance imaging (MRI) machine. It was also made an accredited facility of the Maritime Industry Authority.

the RMM Cold Storage & Meatshop, underscoring the company's steadfast commitment to quality as they import meat products from the United States, Canada, Brazii, and some parts of Europe.

Gheric furthered that the company works closely with regulatory bodies, including the National Meat Inspection Services (NMIS), to ensure compliance with stringent safety standards.

"Actually, we have NMIS office here for proper handling. We are not allowed to open our containers if we don't have a representative from NMIS. Our permit will come from them. If they didn't give us the permit, we wouldn't be able to operate)," shared Rizalyn.

Even in the face of daunting challenges like fluctuating exchange rates and heightened competition, the highest product standards

are non-negotiable to RMM Cold Storage & Meatshop. The company utilizes reefer containers and adheres strictly to temperature controls to ensure optimal conditions for their products.

"At the time of the (African swine fever), our proactive approach to compliance and safety has helped us maintain the highest standards of product integrity," Gheric noted.

A greater challenge was the Covid-19 pandemic where the first four months of the quarantine really took its toll. "We zeroed out," recalled Rizalyn, noting that subsequently, the demand for meat products spiked, and the business even grew more. She credited this to the premium quality of their products.

Fittingly, hailed as "the biggest economic activity in Mabalacat City at the end of troubled 2020" was the opening in Barangay Sapang Biabas of RMM's cold storage

facility with a capacity of two million kilos of frozen meat and seafood products. Four years later, in November 2024. the Manaloto couple were joined in breaking ground for the expansion of that facility by Mayor Crisostomo Garbo, citing its "impact to the local economy and even beyond" as it highlighted the growing investors' confidence in Mabalacat

RMM Cold Storage & Meatshop has three more cold storage facilities located in Miranda and Bagong Bayan in Angeles City, as well as in Calibutbut in Bacolor. They also have a total of 15 meat shops principally located in Pampanga delivering nationwide.

"Our goal is to remain a leader in the industry by continuously improving our processes and ensuring that we meet the evolving needs of our clients," said Gheric of the company's vision.

CITY ORDINANCE NO. 54 Series of 2024

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 53(b) AND THE LAST PAR. THEREOF, ARTICLE XIV, MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS OF CITY ORDINANCE NO. 60, SERIES OF 2016, ENTITLED: "THE NEW CHARTER OF MABALACAT CITY COLLEGE"

WHEREAS, Municipal Ordinance No. 02, Series of 2007, dated October 4, 2007 otherwise known as Mabalacat College Charter (now Mabalacat City College Charter) was enacted, leading to its creation and establishment;

WHEREAS, in 2007, in order to support the establishment and operation of Mabalacat College (now Mabalacat City College) in its initial stage, a three percent (3%) appropriation in the budget was provided to be allocated out of the proceeds of collections from the General Funds, IRA (now National Tax Allotment or NTA), market stall fees and other local fees collected by the City of Mabalacat (then Municipality) in favor of Mabalacat College;

WHEREAS, on 23rd of December 2016, the Sangguniang Panlungsod of Mabalacat City enacted City Ordinance No. 60, series of 2016, creating the "New Charter of Mabalacat City College" amending and repealing for the purpose Municipal Ordinance No. 02, Series of 2007;

WHEREAS, in order to further advance and bolster the Mabalacat City College's operational and infrastructural development, the above-mentioned amendment increased the provision of budget allocation from three percent (3%) to five percent (5%) under its New Charter;

WHEREAS, sometime on August 3, 2017, by virtue of R.A. 10931, the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) Unified Student Financial System for Tertiary Education (UniFAST) program of the Government was established and implemented in 2018 which subsidizes local schools and colleges in their operational efficiency;

WHEREAS, with the onset of CHED UniFAST provisions, it relatively eased the burden on the part of the LGU in the funding of the Mabalacat City College;

WHEREAS, the five percent (5%) allocation to the Mabalacat City College may now be revisited to suit the operational and financial viability of the College thereby maintaining its growth and development;

WHEREAS, it is appropriate to amend Section 53 of the Mabalacat City College ordinance to adjust the 5% allocation, recognizing that the college is now wellestablished and operational;

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 2 of City Ordinance No. 60, series of 2016, Mabalacat City College is likewise declared a "Local Economic Enterprise" with the intent to operate independently and sustainably through its generated revenue;

WHEREAS, the CHED UniFAST tuition fee charged by the Mabalacat City College, being one of the lowest in the country, is not sufficient to withstand it operation;

WHEREAS, Mabalacat City College, being a non-revenue generating educational institution, there is a need to review and assess its capability as a Local Economic Enterprise;

WHEREAS, the Mabalacat City College has since flourished and is now firmly established and operational, having achieved its objectives of providing quality education and community service to the residents of Mabalacat City;

WHEREAS, Mabalacat City College be granted the opportunity to fully realize as being a "Local Economic Enterprise" with Mabalacat City as a clientele by providing additional grants to its students to cover the inadequacy of UniFAST tuition fees;

WHEREAS, this amendment aims to optimize resource allocation and ensure fiscal responsibility by reallocating funds to areas where they can have the most significant impact on community development consistent with Mabalacat City College's fiscal autonomy to ensure efficiency and optimization of resource grants;

WHEREAS, the amendment seeks to promote prudent financial management and enhance the city's capacity to undertake essential projects for the benefit of its residents:

NOW THERFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE SANGGUNIANG PANLUNGSOD OF MABALACAT CITY, PAMPANGA, in session assembled, that:

SECTION 1. That Section 53(b) and the last par. thereof, Article XIV, Miscellaneous Provisions of City Ordinance No. 60, Series of 2016 of the Sangguniang Panlungsod of Mabalacat City, Pampanga, entitled: "The New Charter of Mabalacat City College" is hereby amended, to read as follows:

x x x...

"SECTION 53. Funding - the City Government of Mabalacat shall ensure fiscal autonomy to the College, and as provided for by law, the Sangguniang

Panlungsod is hereby empowered to establish a College Educational Fund which shall consist of:

a) xxx

- b) A minimum of Three percent (3%) to a maximum of Five percent (5%) of the proceeds of collections from the General Funds, National Tax Allotment (NTA), market stall fees and other local fees collected by the City, subject to the approval by the Sangguniang Panlungsod in the Annual Budget Appropriation Ordinance, which shall be released automatically by the Treasurer to the College. The College may request a supplemental budget if the allotted budget is not sufficient to sustain the activities of the College.
- c) xxx
- d) xxx
- e) xxx

The amount to be appropriated for the College Educational Fund shall be approved by the Sangguniang Panlungsod upon recommendation by the Board of the College, to be used exclusively for the improvement of its facilities and equipment, library, school buildings and upgrading of the salaries and allowances of its faculty and support personnel including faculty and staff development, research, and extension services."

SECTION 2. Separability Clause – If any provision of this Ordinance is held invalid or unconstitutional, any other provision not so affected shall continue to be valid and effective.

SECTION 3. Repealing Clause - Any city ordinance, resolution, rules and regulation, or any part thereof, which are inconsistent with any of the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed or amended accordingly.

SECTION 4. Effectivity Clause - This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon approval and posting on conspicuous places within the city







efforts to improve production are crucial to the local industry because, while Zambales is known for producing the tastiest mango fruits in the country, the province produces only 2.3 tons of mangoes per hectare, which is way below the national average of 12 tons per hectare.

"We're now aiming for 12 tons, too," the governor pointed out. "This is the more important, and more difficult, part of sustaining the mango industry because we have to exponentially increase quantity without sacrificing quality to make local mangoes more competitive."

Ebdane stressed that while product promotion has been going on in decades with the annual mango festival, "it was only last year under the Zambales Mango Green Valley Project that serious product development through modern production techniques started under a provincewide program.'

Engr. Domingo Mariano, who heads the technical working group for the Zambales Mango Industry Council (ZMIC), said three pilot areas were established to introduce new production technology to local growers.

Last December, the provincial government released P6.4 million to the SMZ under a conditional assistance program to set the collaboration project in motion, Mariano said.
