Converge FiberXers team governor, Pampanga bizman join SBP board

ARCHEN A. CAYABYAB, team governor of the Converge FiberXers in the Philippine Basketball Association (PBA), and Pampanga businessman Paul Tristan Laus, president of the Laus Group of Companies, have been elected to the Board of Trustees of the Samahang Basketbol ng Pilipinas (SBP).

The SBP announced Tuesday the election of its new 17-member Board of Trustees following the ratification of its updated By-Laws during the National Congress on May 9 and their subsequent approval by the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC). The move marks a new chapter for the national basketball federation, emphasizing inclusivity, accountability, and balanced representation across all basketball sectors.

Cayabyab joins the board as a representative of the Commercial and Professional sector alongside Alfrancis Chua, Manuel V. Pangilinan, and Victorico "Ricky" Vargas. Laus, meanwhile, represents North Luzon, reflecting Central and Northern Luzon's growing influence in the sport. The new board also includes representatives from South Luzon, Visayas, Mindanao, schools, women's basketball, and youth programs—ensuring a nationwide scope of participation and leadership.

Ten of the 17 trustees are serving for the first time, signaling SBP's renewed commitment to fresh perspectives and collaborative leadership.

After the elections, the board elected Pangilinan as chairman, Vargas as president, and Chaye Cabal-Revilla as vice chairman. Pangilinan said the board's composition "reflects how far Philippine basketball has come—more inclusive, more representative, and more forward-looking," while Vargas highlighted the shared goal of "building a stronger, more unified future for Philippine basketball."

Both Cayabyab and Laus are expected to bring their management expertise and regional experience to help the SBP achieve its vision of sustained growth and development for the sport. --PRESS RELEASE

Star Beltway Development attracts Japanese investors

MALOLOS CITY -Japanese investors are
bullish on the Star Beltway
Development (SBD) laid
down by the Provincial
Government of Bulacan
during the economic
mission to the province,
organized by the Philippine
Chamber of Commerce
and Industry-Japan
(PCCIJ).

SBD is the provincial physical framework plan to make Bulacan a financial powerhouse and first-world province of the Philippines by 2040.

Gov. Daniel Fernando presented the components of the Bulacan Star Beltway Development namely the City Civic, Business and Knowledge, and Information Systems Technology Corridor, Airport Development Zone, East and West Economic Belt, Logistics and Industrial Corridor, Agriculture Development Corridor, Aquaculture Development Zone, and the Resource

Sanctuary Corridor.

The governor has particularly offered to the Japanese firms to put their fresh investments in the Logistics and Industrial Corridor where the Bulacan Mega City project is partly located.

Provincial planning and development office OIC Randy Po has explained that it needs an initial P5.01 billion for land development and road network construction for the 400-hectare project.

It covers the municipalities of Bocaue, Balagtas and Pandi beside the northbound lane of the North Luzon Expressway, where it can be a new site of investments for self-sustaining industrial, commercial, financial, and investment centers.

Fernando also offered to the Japanese the City Civic, Business and Knowledge, and Information Systems Technology Corridor, the site where the 12-hectare Bulacan Cyberpark and Business District and the proposed Mixed-Used Development of 7.96-hectare former provincial engineering office compound are located specifically in the City of Malolos and in Guiguinto town, respectively.


PCCIJ chairperson Allan Reyes said those sites have added to the growing interest of Japanese investors in Bulacan.

Among the initial results of this economic mission are investments in the areas of logistics, warehouses, and manufacturing. Beyond trade and investments, Japanese firms are also opening job opportunities for information and communications technology professionals.

As mandated by the Japan-Philippines Economic Partnership Agreement, Japanese employers shall provide free Nihongo language training to their prospective employees and pass it.

On the bigger investment scale, Department of Trade and Industry Region 3 director Edna Dizon told the Japanese investors that investing in Bulacan, as well as in Central Luzon, is a very logical decision considering the availability of a highly-competent workforce and the existing interconnected infrastructure.

Among infrastructures is the North-South Commuter Railway Project, which is being funded by the Japan International Cooperation Agency. Once partially operational by December 2027, it has vital access to the Logistics and Industrial Corridor; City Civic, Business and Knowledge, and Information Systems Technology Corridor; and Airport Development Zone. Two EV charging stations were installed about a month ago at the company's main office. Customers who visit to pay bills, apply for new connections, or make other transactions can now plug in their electric vehicles and charge them for free.

Each charging session is limited to 30 minutes,

giving enough time to top up an EV's battery while customers complete their business inside. The stations are designed for short-term charging only, to give more users the chance to benefit from the service.

According to Sfelapco, a 30-minute charge can provide up to seven kilowatt-





Command responsibility

THE PRINCIPLE of command responsibility emerged from military law. It means that those in authority are answerable not only for their own actions but also for the wrongdoing of their subordinates when they fail to prevent or correct it.

Authority and accountability must always travel together.

In essence, command responsibility says that leaders cannot plead ignorance when abuses occur under their watch. It is not enough to say, "I did not know," or "I did not give the order." The higher one's office, the greater one's duty to ensure integrity, discipline, and justice among those who act in one's name. Power, after all, is not a shield against blame but a summons to vigilance.

This principle applies beyond the military. It extends to anyone entrusted with responsibility whether in government, Church, or civil society. When leaders benefit from loyalty and obedience, they also share in the burden of moral and institutional failure. The privilege to lead carries the duty to answer.

Our nation now confronts a test of leadership that calls precisely for this kind of accountability. The ongoing revelations about massive corruption in flood-control projects expose not just isolated misconduct but systemic rot. The return of the outlawed pork barrel, under new disguisesinsertions, augmentations, allocations, or unprogrammed appropriations—reveals how deeply entrenched the culture of entitlement has become.

The corruption chain runs through every stage of the budget process: from the National Expenditure Program to the General Appropriations Bill, the final law, and even to bicameral and "small committee" adjustments. At every level, signatures were affixed, funds re-channeled, and projects padded or fabricated. These were not accidents; they were choices made by people in authority.

In such circumstances, moral leadership demands more than denial or deflection. The most honorable course for those at the helmboth in the executive and legislative branches—is to assume command responsibility. That does not mean confessing to personal guilt for every infraction, but acknowledging that these abuses happened under their command, and that they bear the duty to ensure truth, justice, and reform.

When corruption corrodes public trust, what restores it is not rhetoric but humility. It would be a powerful gesture for those in the highest offices to say, "The system failed under our watch. We will not protect anyone. We will let the investigation proceed freely, and we will prosecute the guilty, whether friend or ally." Such honesty disarms cynicism and rekindles faith in leadership.

True responsibility is not merely reactive—it is reformative. Leaders who truly take command responsibility will not only allow an independent and unobstructed inquiry; they will also address the structures that enable corruption to recur: discretionary funds without oversight, opaque budget negotiations, and partisan projects disguised as public service. They will empower citizens, local communities, and institutions like the Commission on Audit, the Ombudsman, and the Independent Commission of Inquiry to do their work without fear or favor.

Command responsibility should never be reduced to a political slogan. It is, at its heart, a moral principle. It reminds every person in authority—whether priest, public official, or civil servant—that leadership is a vocation of service. not privilege. The failure of subordinates reflects, to some degree, the failure of supervision, formation, or example from above.

We should therefore not see command responsibility as punishment but as an invitation—to humility, to repentance, to reform. When leaders admit that something went wrong under their care, they recover a measure of moral authority that no position or title can guarantee. Accountability, when sincerely embraced, is not weakness; it is the highest form of leadership.

If the country is to recover from this moral and fiscal crisis, its leaders must choose the harder path: to tell the truth, to clean their own ranks, and to rebuild trust through transparency and justice. Only then can they claim the moral right to command—and only then will the people believe again that authority can still serve the common good.

CSF Water District: Public trust betrayed

FOR SEVERAL years now, the subscribers of the City of San Fernando Water District (CSFWD), in partnership with PrimeWater Infrastructure through a joint venture agreement (JVA), have been experiencing persistent and unresolved problems involving water quality, service reliability, billing concerns, and lack of transparency in operations.

As consumers and stakeholders, we are now compelled to ask: What has the CSFWD done to protect the interest of the Fernandinos?

CSFWD legal mandate

The CSFWD is governed under Presidential Decree 198 (The Provincial Water Utilities Act of 1973) which clearly states that water districts are publicly-owned utilities created to provide adequate, safe, and affordable water service to the people.

The CSFWD Board of Directors is legally bound

- PD 198, Section 31 Duty to ensure efficient management and operations
- RA 6713 (Code of Conduct and Ethical Standards for Public Officials and Employees) -Duty to act with responsibility, integrity, transparency,

and public accountability

- RA 3019 (Anti-Graft and Corrupt Practices Act) - Prohibits causing undue injury, neglect of duty, or giving unwarranted benefit to any private party
- RA 11032 (Ease of Doing Business and Anti-Red Tape Act) – Requires streamlined, transparent, and accessible public service transactions.

These laws make it clear, CSFWD is accountable to the consumers. The Board of Directors is required by law to act in the best interest of the public. Yet today, what is happening is the opposite.

Lack of transparency and public accountability

Secret deal

It sucks, says newly minted Ombudsman Jesus Crispin "Boying" Remulla, almost sounding off like it's obscene by decent ethical standard, assuming that there's still such a thing in this neck of the

Remulla decries the alleged secret order signed with his body and soul by his predecessor Samuel Martires as a free pass to Sen. Joel Villanueva, who has been burning at the seams at the allegations of corruption, then and now.

How could Remulla be so naïve as to expect that his predecessor was incapable of such a mischief as a secret order given his task of national import? The Ombudsman is supposed to guard the people versus corruption in the three branches of government, with some restrictions. Implicit in the task is of not being a robot and being independent.

To be forewarned is to be forearmed, cautioned an old adage. Remulla has apparently ignored the signs on the wall. Lawyer Edwin Lacierda, former President Noynoy Aquino's press secretary and legal adviser noticed the signs: Martires was a coddler of former President Duterte. In other words, for a discerning lawyer like Lacierda, the weighing scale was unmistakably tipped on the other side.

There were things that became difficult to have or access during Duterte's time. For one thing, copies of statements of assets and liabilities (SALNs) of government officials, elected or appointed. Martires stood on the way; they were being weaponized, he said. But SALNs are the first step to find out who may have been dipping their fingers in the cookie jar.

Given his naivette or trust, Remulla laid out in public a not-so-grand plan. He wanted a previous order by a former Ombusman, Conchita Morales Carpio, to be implemented by the Senate after nine years of dilly-dallying or ignorance. Villanueva had been recommended for dismissal by Morales. He would write a letter to the new Senate President about the order and ask that it be implemented, pronto. The SP and the nation eagerly awaited the upshot, given the national, even global, humilation, triggered by the massive infra corruption that seems to grow at every turn of investigation.

Lo and behold, R emulla was shooting at the moon. It turned out that Morales' order had been reversed, long ago, by Martires, with all the legal clearance and certification showing Remulla was merely barking up the wrong tree, or as Villanueva put it, simple and plain harassment. Alas, nobody knew about it, or so it seemed.

Facing a dead route, Remulla has cancelled his plan that failed to appreciate the smart move of his predecessor. Martires has done his homework well .Now, it can't be reversed because it's final. Otherwise, there will be a violation of the double jeopardy rule. You can't cook even a crook over the same fire.

There was a time when the Ombudsman was called Tanodbayan. It meant what it was meant to do: be a watchdog. Times have changed. Secret orders or deals were a no-no during former President Aquino's Tanodbayan time, or they were oxymoron.

Even President Bongbong Marcos was aghast at the secret order and wants it investigated thoroughly. His sister, Sen.Imee Marcos, was silently in glee, if not celebrating or gloating. She had opposed Remulla's Ombudsman bid from the get go. Villanueva was a fellow admirer of the former president and other causes for the political family, including the impeachment trial of the vice president which has been delayed, if not dead-thanks to her and the other pro-Duterte far as

Former Senator Rene Saguisag was always wary of the Ombudsman in his time. Every time he shook his hands, Saguisag confessed that he would immediately count his fingers after the hand-shake to make sure not one was missing.

Apparently, Remulla had a healthier view of his predecessor's reputation. Until the belated disclosure and Martires's own admission of the fact. Martires' order maybe final, meaning Villanueva is safe, borrowing from Sen. Marcoleta's favorite term, as far as Morales's recommendation is concerned. But the former Ombudsman is not yet totally off the hook. Legal experts say certain administrative liabilities will keep him on his toes in the future, notwithstanding his stature.

Remulla has started to build an image as a skillful and no-non-sense crime buster hero after handling the case of the missing sabungeros which has been considered a cold one three years ago. His detective-sleuthing and legal execution plus a gift for media savvy have endeared him to the victims and those who hope to see a happy

According to the Department of Education, more than one in three Filipino students have experienced some form of bullying



a major risk factor for depression, anxiety, and self-harm. Online bullying is uniquely destructive because of its permanence and reach. Digital insults don't fade with time; they are archived, shared, and replayed endlessly.

But beyond the digital cruelty lies a deeper issue - the neglect of mental health. In the Philippines, mental illness remains cloaked in stigma. In a 2021 study by the National Center for Mental Health, it is estimated that at least 3.6 million Filipinos suffer from mental, neurological, or substance-use disorders. Despite this number, only a tiny fraction receive professional help. The WHO reports that the country's suicide rate among youth aged 15 - 29 has more than doubled in the past decade.

What makes this crisis worse


cultural tendency to invalidate pain, to dismiss sadness as weakness, or to equate suffering with lack of faith or gratitude. In reality, what they truly need is compassion, professional help, and understanding.

Mental health is not a fad, a trend or a luxury. It is actually a lifeline. We must all work together to create environments where young people feel seen and safe. On top of the enforcement of cyberbullying laws, empathy must be taught. Conversations about emotional well-being should not be confined to crisis moments; they must become part of our everyday language.

a. That, upon proper notice and hearing, the Last Will and Testament of Petitioner Glenn Kurt Gustav Hoehle be approved, allowed and admitted to probate.

b. That letters-testamentary be issued to executor Atty. Romela M. Eleria-Gases, CPA, REB without bond to allow her to manage and distribute the estate of the Petitioner to the beneficiary named in the Last Will and Testament after the testator's death.

The material allegations of the Petition state:

Petitioner GLENN KURT GUSTAV HOEHLE is the testator, who wishes to have his own will probated during his lifetime in accordance with the second paragraph of Section 1 of Rule 76 of the Rules of Court.

He executed last August 04, 2025 a Last Will and Testament in accordance with the formalities of the Republic of the Philippines.

The said Last Will and Testament, consisting of eight pages, was duly notarized by Atty. Kristelle R. Briones with Doc. No. 703, Page No. 28, Book No. IV, Series of 2025. The subscribing witnesses to the said will are: (1) Juan Miguel M. Gases, (2) Brenda M. Elaria-Frazer, and (3) Cristina P. Obias, all of whom are residents of Angeles City.

That the sole beneficiary named in the will is **Jonalyn Miguel Celis**, who is of legal age having been born on May 09, 1985 and is thus forty years of age as of the time of filing of this Petition. The will provides that such properties of the testator located in the Philippines shall be for her sole and exclusive benefit and shall not form part of any conjugal partnership or absolute community of property that she may have with her spouse or with any future spouse.

That in the event that the sole beneficiary, Jonalyn Miguel Celis, is unable or unwilling to accept the inheritance, the will designates her son, **David Lawrence Miguel Celis**, who is a minor, as substitute beneficiary, provided he is of legal age at the time of succession. If he is still a minor, the Executor shall hold the properties in trust until he reaches the age of majority.

That the Petitioner has appointed Atty. Romela M. Eleria-Gases, CPA, REB, as the executor of his Philippine estate. She is designated to serve without bond, with full authority to manage and settle the Philippine assets in accordance with the terms of the will.

The will covers only the Petitioner's Philippine estate, and that the probable value of the estate exceeds Two Million Pesos (Php2,000,00.00), and is thus within the jurisdiction of the Honorable Regional Trial Court.

That the Petitioner at the time of the execution of the said will was of legal age, of sound and disposing mind, and not acting under duress, fraud, or undue influence and was in every respect capacitated to dispose of his estate by will.

That the testator has no other compulsory heir aside from his daughter, herein respondent Pascale Tiana Hoehle, to whom he bequeathed all of his properties located in Switzerland, and thus, whose legitime is adequately protected in accordance with Swiss laws.

That there are no other legatees, devisees and heirs named in the will other than those

That pursuant to the Rules of Court, a person is allowed to probate his or her will during their lifetime which dispenses with the publication requirement and would only require notices to be given to the testator's compulsory heirs.

Let this Order he published, at the expense of the petitioner, once a week for three (3) consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the Province of Pampanga and Angeles

t each of the known heirs, legatees, devisees, creditors, and executor of the GLENN KURT GUSTAV HOEHLE be furnished with a copy of this Order.

Lastly, the court directs the petitioner to effect proper service of this Order upon respondent Pascale Tiana Hoehle, in accordance with Administrative Order No. 251-2020,1 and ensure that the respondent is notified at least ten (10) days before the initial hearing.

Furnish the Clerk of Court, Office of the Clerk of Court, Regional Trial Court, Angeles City; the petitioner and his counsel, the named beneficiary and to the subscribing witnesses in the subject Last Will and Testament, each a copy of this Order.

ORDER

The count notes petitioner's motion for leave of court to admit attached amended petition, dated September 5, 2025, and admits said amended petition into the records.

Before this court is an amended petition for recognition of foreign judgment, filed by petitioner Marvin V. Paule, Jr., with regard to the foreign divorce obtained in Canada on April 15, 2016, ordering the dissolution of the marriage between him and Jackie Lou Silvosa Paule, also known as Jackie Lou B. Silvosa.

Petitioner, prays that this court recognize said foreign divorce and direct the Philippine Statistics Authority (PSA), through the Civil Registrar General and the Local Civil Registrar of Lubao, Pampanga to: (1) annotate the fact of said divorce on the parties' certificate of marriage, to reflect the dissolution of their marriage; and (2) declare petitioner as capacitated to contract a subsequent marriage.

Petitioner alleges that he and private respondent were classmates in kindergarten. They met again in high school and became a couple during college. They were married on December 8, 2002 in Lubao, Pampanga. For a time, their marriage was harmonious and lived peacefully. They have one child, Nicole Silvosa Paule.

In 2004, petitioner was involved in drug use and was admitted at the Central Luzon Rehabilatation Center for treatment. He alleges that his situation worsened and he suffered a relapse in 2013. He returned to rehabilitation a number of times but was supposedly unable to break free from his addiction. Respondent then decided to leave and relocate with their child to Canada. Respondent filed for divorce with 'le Vancouver Law Courts of Canada. On March 15, 2016, the Supreme Court of British Columbia issued a final order, stating that the parties were divorced.

The petition is sufficient in form and substance. Set this case for hearing on February 4, 2026 at 8:30 in the morning, before this court, at the Hall of Justice, San Matias, Guagua, Pampanga.

Let this order be published once a week for three (3) consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the province of Pampanga, expenses to be borne by petitioner. The Civil Registrar General, as well as any person having or claiming any interest in the petition may, within fifteen (15) days from notice of the petition or from the last date of publication of such notice, file the pertinent pleading and appear on the date and time mentioned above to show cause why the petition should not be granted.

Let copies of the petition, its annexes, and this order be furnished the Solicitor General, the Provincial Prosecutor of Pampanga, and the Civil Registrar General.



Peak Travel Reminders for the Undas Break

AS THE PEAK TRAVEL to Clark International season of Undas Airport. All other DG flights approaches, Cebu Pacific (CEB) remains committed to ensuring a safe and seamless journey for its passengers. To help travelers prepare, here are reminders to make every Juan's trip smoother and more convenient:

1. Check the airport terminal assignment of your flight

Before proceeding to the airport, passengers are strongly advised to check the details in their itineraries and boarding passes, especially the flight number and terminal assignment. Flight numbers begin with either 5J, DG, or T6:

• 5J flights: Operated by Cebu Pacific using larger commercial jet aircraft. These flights to and from Manila arrive at and depart from Ninoy Aquino International Airport (NAIA) Terminal 3.

• DG flights: Operated by Cebgo using smaller turboprop aircraft.

 T6 flights: Operated by AirSWIFT using smaller turboprop aircraft. These flights to and from Manila arrive at and depart from NAIA Terminal 2.

Starting October 26, some DG flights between Manila and Naga and all flights between Manila and San Jose (Occidental Mindoro) will be transferred

to and from Manila will remain at NAIA Terminal 2. checking in, we encourage passengers to immediately go through immigration and final security to avoid delays. Boarding

B. Counters A1-A15 are dedicated for online check-in passengers, while Counters A17-A29 and B1-B15 are for passengers



2. Be on time at the airport

Given expected heavier road traffic during peak travel season, passengers are advised to allot more time for traffic going to the airport. We advise passengers to be at the airport at least three (3) hours before departure for domestic flights, and four (4) hours for international flights. Passengers traveling to Dubai are allowed to check in as early as seven (7) hours before departure.

Check-in counters close 45 minutes before the scheduled time of departure for domestic flights and one (1) hour for international flights to ensure there is ample time for all necessary preflight procedures. After

commences 45 minutes before the scheduled departure.

3. Check in online

Long lines may be avoided at the airport by checking in via the official CEB mobile app or via the Manage Booking section of the CEB website. Both options are available from 48 hours up to one (1) hour before the scheduled time of departure for domestic flights, and up to two (2) hours before scheduled departure for international fliers.

Domestic passengers who checked in online and do not have check-in baggage may go straight to the boarding gates.

CEB's check-in counters at NAIA Terminal 3 are located at Aisles A and who have not checked in online.

4. Accomplish eTravel Forms for International Trip

For a smooth experience at the immigration counters, passengers traveling internationally are encouraged to register or update their eTravel forms within 72 hours or three (3) days before departure from and arrival to the Philippines, then save the QR code generated at the end of the form.

For roundtrip international flights, passengers are required to complete the eTravel form twice — once for the departure flight, and again for the arrival flight.

After generating the eTravel QR code, complete

the Customs Declaration Form before arrival. Passengers are advised to keep the eTravel QR code as this will be scanned by customs officers after baggage claiming at the arrival carousel.

eTravel forms can be accomplished by accessing www.etravel.gov.ph.

For specific travel requirements of our international destinations, visit https://help. cebupacificair.com/articles/ flying-out-soon#travelguides.

5. Baggage Policy

Passengers may board the flight with one (1) carry-on bag that fits in the overhead bin and one (1) personal item like a purse, small backpack, or laptop bag that fits under the seat in front of them. Both hand-carry baggage are free of charge and must have a combined weight of 7kg or less. Bags that are not within the allowable size or weight will be intercepted and charged at the boarding gate.

Passengers are encouraged to purchase prepaid baggage online via the CEB website or mobile app which is up to 4x cheaper than airport charges. CEB's enhanced baggage policy allows passengers to avail up to three (3) pieces of 20kg

baggage. For every piece of baggage purchased, passengers may also add an extra 4kg, 8kg, or 12kg weight allowance on top of the initial 20kg.

Passengers may purchase additional baggage allowance online up to two (2) hours before departure.

6. Self-tag luggage for select domestic destinations

Passengers flying out of select domestic destinations (Bacolod, Butuan, Cagayan de Oro, Clark, Coron, Davao, General Santos, Iloilo, Manila, Puerto Princesa, Siargao, Tacloban, Tagbilaran, and Zamboanga) are reminded to self-tag their check-in luggage at the designated kiosks at the airport, prior to proceeding to counters for bag drops. Self-bag drop kiosks are also available at NAIA Terminal 3 and Clark International Airport.

The Clark-based company, which has been operating since 2012 and exports to more than 60 countries across five continents, announced that 466 employees were laid off this week, with more expected in the coming weeks if the situation remains unresolved.

The EU ban, which has been in effect since 2023, stems from the Philippine government's failure to submit a required Residue Monitoring Plan — a compliance document the EU requested as early as 2019 and expected by 2021. The Residue Monitoring Plan is necessary for the export of both shelf-stable and non-shelf-stable food products containing eggs and dairy.

Neighboring countries such as China, Japan, and Thailand have long complied with the EU requirement, allowing their food exporters to continue trading freely. The Philippines, however, has yet to complete its submission, leaving companies like La Rose Noire without access to one of their largest markets.

"Europe has always been our biggest export destination," a company representative said. "We have all the international certifications, follow EU food safety standards, and use only EU-approved ingredients. Yet, our products are being blocked—not because of noncompliance on our part, but because the Philippine government has not



fulfilled its obligation to submit this one crucial document."

La Rose Noire has certifications from the Philippine FDA, as well as international accreditations under FSSC and GMP standards. Despite this, the company's products are being rejected in the EU simply due to the country's pending Residue Monitoring Plan compliance.

The impact has been immediate and severe. Export to Europe for their world class products like macarons, cheesecakes, croissants and chocolates have been denied entry into the EU since 2023.

It has been more than 2 years since the company has been coordinating and urging the Philippine government to comply with EU requirements. Recently, even their shelf-stable products like tarts, cones and baskets are affected too and banned entering France.

Orders from long-time European

partners have been cancelled, and orders have stopped coming in.
Management said it had no choice but to start reducing its workforce.
The company warned that unless urgent action is taken, even more Filipino workers could lose their jobs, and the future of its Clark facility could be at risk.

La Rose Noire chose to transfer its factory from China to the Philippines in 2012 precisely because there were no regulatory barriers. For over a decade, it has invested heavily in the Philippines, producing premium pastry, bakery, and chocolate products from our Clark facility for luxury hotels, airlines, institutions, and cruise lines worldwide.

Beyond its business, La Rose Noirs has built five schools for indigent Filipinos and trained 371 scholars thus far, through its La Rose Noire Foundation's Bakery, Bread, Pastry and Barista programs — as the company believes in uplifting the communities around the factory.

"We appeal to the Philippine
Government to act swiftly and
decisively," the company said.
"Hundreds of livelihoods depend on
this. The longer the delay, the more
irreversible the damage becomes—
not just to La Rose Noire, but to the
reputation of the country's entire food
export industry."

La Rose Noire Philippines, with Clark Development Corp. assisting the whole way, said it continues to coordinate with the Philippines FDA, Department of Agriculture, Department of Foreign Affairs, and the Office of the President, expressing hope that the issue can still be resolved soon.

The company also assured that it remains committed to re-employing affected workers once EU market access is restored.






THE GOLDEN RESURGENCE

HOW PINATUBO'S SURVIVORS BECAME LIFELINES FOR NORTHERN CEBU

THE NIGHT of Sept. 30 began in calm silence. It was my birthday, and I was in Pampanga, fast asleep and grateful for another year of life. The air was still, the streets quiet, and I had no idea that hundreds of kilometers away, the earth beneath Northern Cebu was quietly gathering its fury. Streetlights shimmered faintly over the resting towns. Families, like me, were deep in slumber, unaware that in just a few moments, the ground would awaken with a roar.

THE NIGHT of Sept. 30 began in calm silence. It was my birthday, and I was in Pampanga, fast asleep and grateful for another year of life. The air was still, the streets quiet, and I had no idea that hundreds of kilometers away, the earth beneath Northern Cebu was quietly gathering its fury. Streetlights shimmered faintly over the resting towns. Families, like me, were deep in slumber, unaware that in just a few moments, the ground would awaken with a roar. Without warning, the stillness broke. The

Without warning, the stillness broke. The earth raged. Walls collapsed like paper. Cries pierced the night. A 6.9-magnitude earthquake ripped through the province, turning homes into rubble and safety into fear. Even after the tremors stopped, the aftershocks came in relentless waves, shaking not only the soil but the spirits of those who endured.

the spirits of those who endured.

Upon deployment, when I later walked through the cracked streets of Bogo and Medellin, I could almost feel the echoes of that night beneath my feet. Every vibration carried the weight of loss, the memory of terror. It was not just the land that fractured; it was the people's peace, their sense of certainty.

When the going gets tough, Pampanga never hesitates to act. The province that once rose from the ashes of Mount Pinatubo has learned to move with both urgency and compassion. This time was no different. Within days, Team Pampanga, led by Vice Gov. Delta Pineda, was on the ground in Northern Cebu, bringing relief and reassurance to those who needed it most.

As part of the team, it was my task to document these moments — to capture how Kapampangans, whose spirits were once broken by disaster, now stood as symbols of hope.

Yet amid the ruins, something stronger than destruction emerged. Compassion rose from the dust, as if the earth itself was reminding us that even in its fury, humanity can still choose to heal.

HOLDING ON TO HOPE IN BOGO CITY

In Barangay Pandan, Bogo City, makeshift tents of blue and orange lined the open field. They shimmered weakly under the sun, fragile shelters against the unpredictable nights. Inside one of them lived Maricel Balawing, her eyes weary but bright with determination.

For more than ten days, she and her neighbors have been living on bare ground. Every night, they pray the tremors will stop. Every morning, they begin again.

"We had to rush and pick up what we had in order to survive," Maricel told me, her hands trembling slightly as she recalled the night the earth turned violent. Beside her, her loyal dog Molly lay quietly, as if understanding every work

Molly lay quietly, as if understanding every word.
They sleep under tarpaulins, they eat what little they can, yet they wake each day grateful to still be alive. Hope has become their most valuable possession.

MAKESHIFT SHELTERS FOR HOME

When Kapampangan Hearts Came Knocking From the plains of Pampanga came the sound of engines and the sight of trucks filled with rice, food packs, and warm smiles.

Three decades ago, Kapampangans knew this kind of pain. They watched as Mount Pinatubo buried their towns in ash. They felt what it was like to lose everything. Their homes, their farms, their future—all swallowed by gray skies and silence.


But time turned their suffering into strength. From the ashes, compassion grew.

From loss, they learned how to lift others up. Now it was their turn to give back.

LEAD TRUCK IN A CONVOY OF RELIEF

Led by Vice Governor Dennis "Delta" Pineda, the Provincial Government of Pampanga journeyed across the sea to reach Northern Cebu. They brought 120,000 relief packs. But more than supplies, they brought presence. They came with open arms, ready to listen, ready to stand beside those who were afraid to rise again.

"We came here not only to help but to remind our brothers and sisters in Cebu that they are not alone," Vice Gov. Delta said softly but firmly, his

voice steady amid the noise of recovery.

From the repacking stations to the distribution lines, Kapampangan volunteers worked side by side with Cebuano residents. Sweat, tears, and laughter mixed under the designated sites. Bayanihan was no longer a word. It was a living, breathing force.

The same people whose spirits were once shattered by a volcano now stood tall as lifelines for others shaken by the earth. Their hearts, once broken by tragedy, had turned to gold.

MAYOR MARIA CIELO MARTINEZ A PILLAR OF STRENGTH IN BOGO

In the shattered city stood Mayor Maria Cielo Martinez, a woman whose courage radiated even in exhaustion. When the earthquake struck, she did not hide behind walls. She went out into the chaos, leading rescue teams herself, her hands reaching out to those trapped beneath fallen beams.

"It is a lot of work," she told me, her voice calm but her eyes heavy with sleeplessness. "But with all the support we are getting, parang hindi na rin ganun kahirap."

Mayor Martinez welcomes Team Pampanga She spoke of Pampanga with deep gratitude. "They came all the way from Luzon to help us. Beyond ang efforts ng mga Kapampangan," she said, her voice breaking into a faint smile.

I realized then that true leadership is not about authority. It is about compassion in motion, courage in

the middle of despair.

SERVING THROUGH THE AFTERSHOCKS

Visiting Daanbantayan, I met two public servants whose strength left a lasting mark. Fiel Condino and Giselle Ponce, the municipal information officers, carried not only cameras but also the heavy duty of documenting pain and perseverance.

"We only got to secure our cameras today because the second floor of the municipal hall collapsed," Fiel shared, his tone quiet but resolute. With their main office gone, hundreds of local government workers continued their duties inside a multipurpose hall turned operations center. There was no airconditioning, no comfort, only commitment. Their exhaustion was visible, but so was their faith.

When Team Pampanga arrived, the hall brightened with new energy. The Kapampangans' arrival reminded them that they were not fighting alone. Their courage was met with compassion, their fear with fellowship.

DIGGING FOR 'SASING' On the shores of Kawit,

On the shores of Kawit, Medellin, I saw another kind of resilience. The sea glittered under the morning sun, calm and endless. Along the coast, women worked silently, digging through the sand with their bare hands. One of them was Nanay JM Delos Reyes. With her son beside her, she searched for 'sasing', the sand

worms that the locals use for kinilaw and adobo.

"After two years, it's just now that we get to look for sasing again," she told me. "Maybe it's because of the earthquake that changed the waves." Her hands moved with patience and rhythm, her eyes steady on the tide. For her and many others, these worms meant more than food. They meant survival. They meant normalcy returning, one tide at a time. Even the sea, it seemed, was beginning to heal.

FROM ASHES TO ACTION

The Kapampangans' journey to Cebu was more than a relief mission. It was a full circle of history. The same province that once cried for help after the eruption of Mount Pinatubo was now the one answering the call of others in distress. What was once despair had transformed into empathy. What was once ruin had become redemption.

Under the guidance of Vice Gov. Delta Pineda, their golden hearts shone brighter than ever. Every handshake, every meal pack, every smile they shared became a symbol of how far they had come—from victims to heroes, from ash to aid. Their story is a reminder that even when the ground crumbles, kindness can rebuild what concrete cannot.

REFLECTIONS FROM THE ROAD

On our way back to the city, the sky over Mandaue burst into color. Iridescent clouds shimmered like oil on water, an unearthly

sight after days of dust and grief. Everyone stopped to look. For a brief moment, silence returned, not the silence of fear, but of awe. It was as if the heavens themselves were blessing those who endured.

Food – as much for the belly as for the mind

belly as for the mind
Before leaving Cebu,
we stopped at Taboan
Market. The smell of
chorizo de Cebu and
danggit filled the air, rich
and comforting. I thought
of the Kapampangans, of
how their pain became
purpose, of how kindness
can travel farther than any
relief truck.

At Titay's in Liloan, I bit into a crisp rosquillos cookie and smiled. The taste was simple, sweet, and deeply human. It was the taste of resilience.

EPILOGUE: THE PULSE THAT NEVER FALTERS

Every disaster leaves a scar, but it also leaves a lesson. From the ashes of Pinatubo to the fractured soil of Cebu, the Kapampangans have proven that the strongest structures are not built from stone or steel. They are built from courage, empathy, and the will to rise again.

Their story is not just one of survival. It is a story of rebirth, of hearts that once broke in tragedy now glowing with purpose. When the earth trembles and the sky darkens, they are the light that endures. Turning tables: A working student's journey from the production floor to Latin honors

PORAC, PAMPANGA --- In a moment filled with pride and tears, 25-year-old Kenneth Calma, a production worker at Mekeni Food Corp., walked across the stage to receive his diploma and medal as magna cum laude, graduating with a Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education from Pampanga State University last Aug. 12.

Behind the applause and academic honors lies a story of resilience, sacrifice, and a young man's deep love for his family.

From Factory Floor to **Academic Glory**

For Kenneth, earning a college degree was not only a personal triumph – it was the fulfillment of his entire family's dream. Born and raised in Balubad, Porac, he is the son of Rosito and Reyna Calma, a barangay tanod and a homemaker. Growing up with eight siblings, Kenneth knew early on that life would be difficult—but he also knew that hope would always keep them going.

His siblings worked hard to support the family: Linuel and Genesis served as house boys for Mekeni executives Lito and Adrian Garcia; Merwin worked in the warehouse; and Jennica and Jivon joined the packaging section. His brother Rosito Jr., through the help of the Garcia family, earned a degree in Accountancy from Holy Angel University and became the family's breadwinner until illness forced him to stop working. Kenneth's twin, Kevin, was not



able to finish his studies. Amid these challenges, Kenneth made a promise to himself – to continue what others could not, and to change the course of their family's life.

Juggling Work, School, and Dreams

Even as a senior high school student, Kenneth was already working. He started as an on-call worker at Mekeni, doing

odd jobs - sweeping floors, carrying goods, and even cleaning homes – just to earn extra income for the family.

In 2020, he became a regular employee at Mekeni as a checker in the packaging section. But when the Covid-19 pandemic hit in 2021, he resigned to pursue his dream of becoming a teacher. He enrolled at Don Honorio Ventura State University (now

Pampanga State University) while still working part-time in Mekeni's warehouse. By 2023, he returned to the company as a full-time production worker.

His daily routine was grueling: working from 6 p.m. to 2:30 a.m., sometimes longer, then heading straight to school for classes from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. Sleep was a luxury. There were times when exhaustion got the better of him, and he would doze off in class. Yet, despite the fatique, Kenneth remained one of the top students. His professors saw his potentialand his perseverance.

Faith, Family, and the Fire to Succeed

There were moments when Kenneth felt like giving up. He admitted that he initially hid his studies from his supervisor, fearing he might lose his job. But the thought of his mother's dream – to have a teacher in the family – kept him going.

"Wala po lahat ng ito kung wala ang nanay ko at pamilya ko. Lahat ng ginagawa ko ay para sa kanila. Gusto ko pong baguhin ang takbo ng buhay namin," he tearfully shared.

And indeed, he did. After years of sleepless nights, long shifts, and endless sacrifices, Kenneth proudly graduated magna cum laude – a success not only for himself but for his entire family, community, and the company that believed in














ORDINANCE NO. 751, S-2025 (PO-468-07-25)

AN ORDINANCE REQUIRING LESSORS TO SUBMIT LESSEE INFORMATION TO THE BARANGAY AND OBTAIN FROM LESES A BARANGAY OCCUPANCY CLEARANCE PRIOR TO ANY OCCUPATION OF RENTAL PROPERTIES WITHIN ANGELES CITY, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF.

WHEREAS, Section 6, Article II of the 1987 Constitution provides that, "The liberty of abode and of changing the same within the limits prescribed by law shall not be impaired except upon lawful order of the court. Neither shall the right to travel be impaired except in the interest of national security, public safety, or public health, as may be provided by law";

WHEREAS, Section 16, Republic Act ("R.A.") No. 7160, otherwise known as the Local Government Code of 1991 ("LGC"), provides that, "Every local government unit shall exercise the powers expressly granted, those necessarily implied therefrom, as well as powers necessary, appropriate, or incidental for its efficient and effective governance, and those which are essential to the promotion of the general welfare. Within their respective territorial jurisdictions, local government units shall xxx maintain peace and order, and preserve the comfort and convenience of their inhabitants";

WHEREAS, there is a growing concern over the increasing number of criminal activities such as illegal drug operations, cybersex crimes, prostitution, and robbery syndicates being discreetly conducted in unlisted or unregistered lodging properties;

WHEREAS, it is the goal of the City Government of Angeles to strengthen the partnership between communities and law enforcement by enforcing regulations that promote accountability and preventive monitoring of rental properties;

WHEREAS, in lieu of the aforementioned matters, the City of Angeles herein takes measures to implement the registration and maintenance of registry in furtherance to the implementation of stricter measures to reduce if not eradicate crimes and drug-related cases prevalent in the City;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ORDAINED by the 20th Sangguniang Panlungsod of Angeles City, in Session duly assembled that:

SECTION 1. TITLE. This Ordinance shall be known as the "Tenant Registration Ordinance of Angeles City".

SECTION 2. DEFINITION OF TERMS. For purposes of this Ordinance, these terms are defined as follows:

- a.Barangay Occupancy Clearance a clearance issued by the Barangay prior to occupancy of the lessee which shall serve as proof that the lessee/tenant has personally appeared before the Barangay.
- b.Consent refers to any freely given, specific, informed indication of will, whereby the tenant agrees to the collection and processing of personal information about and/or relating to him or her.
- c.Lessor/landlord— a lessor, for purposes of this ordinance, refers to a natural person engaged in the business of leasing or letting property to another, whether or not with a necessary permit or license.
- d.Lessee/tenant refers to a person who holds a lease, or who shall occupy a property in the respective barangay, within Angeles City, with a lease period of at least three (3) weeks, whether continuous of staggered.
- e.Lease Agreement the agreement entered into between lessor and lessee for the rent of the subject property;
- f.Personal Information Controller ("PIC") refers to a natural person or any other body, who controls the processing of personal data, or instructs another to process data on his/her behalf.
- g.Rental Properties refers, but is not limited to, apartments, boarding houses, transient rooms, condotels, rental residences, bedspacers.
- SECTION 3. DECLARATION OF POLICY. It is the policy of the City Government of Angeles to prevent the use of rental properties as venues for criminal activities and to promote peace, order, and public safety in all barangays.
- SECTION 4. COVERAGE. This Ordinance shall cover all lessors and lessees who shall enter into lease agreements with a minimum of three (3) week rentals for the subject properties.

This ordinance shall further cover all residential rental properties including but not limited to apartments, boarding houses, bed spaces, transient homes, dormitories, condotels, and any structure or portion of a building leased or rented for residential purposes.

SECTION 5. OBLIGATIONS OF LESSORS. The Lessors shall have the following duties and obligations in the collection and submission of data:

- a. The Lessor shall register the property that is subject for lease for compliance of this ordinance;
- b. The Lessor shall submit to the PIC in the Barangay, a copy of the Lease Agreement along with the Data Privacy Consent Form and a copy of the Barangay Occupancy Clearance/Police Clearance acquired by the Lessee, attached therewith;
- c.The Lessor shall update the PIC in the Barangay for any updates, amendments, revisions, or extensions, on the lease agreements entered into:
- d. The Lessor shall duly inform the respective barangay should the lease agreement be terminated; and
- e. The Lessor is obliged to inform the barangay the information of the lessee those lease agreements falling three (3) weeks below.

SECTION 5-A. The documentary requirements that the Lessor shall submit to the Barangay prior to the commencement of a lease agreement are as follows:

- a. Original Lease Agreement between Lessor and the Lessee;
- b. Photocopy of one (1) valid government-issued identification card bearing the lessee and each accompanying occupants' full name, picture, and signature;
- Photocopy of the Data Privacy Consent Form; and C.
- d.Photocopy of the Barangay Occupancy Clearance or a Police Clearance from the previous barangay resided from.

SECTION 5-B. DATA PRIVACY AND CONFIDENTIALITY. In compliance with R.A. No. 10173 or the Data Privacy Act of 2012, the Data Privacy Form shall have the following provisions, to wit:

- a."I understand that the information I am providing will be used for community safety purposes and will be protected in accordance with the Data Privacy Act. I consent to the processing of my personal data as outlined."; and
- b. The collection and handling of all tenant information shall strictly comply with the Data Privacy Act of 2012. Tenants shall be informed of their rights and how their information will be used and protected."

All personal data collected under this ordinance shall be:

- 1. Collected lawfully, fairly, and for legitimate purposes related to public safety and community welfare;
- 2. Stored securely in the official records of the Barangay and used only for law enforcement coordination and crime prevention;
- 3. Accessed only by authorized barangay personnel and law enforcement agents, when necessary;
- 4. Protected in accordance with Republic Act No. 10173, otherwise known as the Data Privacy Act of 2012;
- 5. Retained only as long as necessary for its intended purpose and securely disposed of thereafter.

SECTION 6. OBLIGATIONS OF THE LESSEE. The Lessee shall have the obligation to personally register with the respective barangay to secure a Barangay Occupancy Clearance and furnish a copy thereof to the Lessor within seven (7) days from the start of the lease agreement or move-in.

The Lessee shall also furnish a barangay clearance from the previous residence or a police clearance and furnish the Lessor a copy thereof.

SECTION 7. IMPLEMENTING AUTHORITY. In compliance with the Department of Interior and Local Government ("DILG") Memorandum Circular (M.C.) No. 2024-135, and the Local Government Unit Support System ("LGUSS") – Barangay Information Management System ("BIMS"), the Barangay shall have the following obligations:

- a. The Barangay Chairperson shall designate or appoint a Personal Information Controller ("PIC") who is responsible for processing and keeping the information collected. The PIC can be the Barangay Secretary.
- b. The Barangay PIC shall maintain a database or repository of data of all rental properties within the Barangay Hall.
- c. The Barangay PIC shall maintain a database or repository, and upload the necessary tenant information to the DILG's LGUSS-BIMS website.
- d. The Barangay Council shall coordinate with law enforcement for time-to-time on-site verification that the subject property is listed as for lease.

e.The Barangay PIC shall retain information only as long as necessary as determined by the PIC for the fulfillment of the purposes for which they were obtained or for the establishment, exercise or defense of legal claims, or for legitimate business purposes, or as provided by law.

f.The Barangay PIC shall observe utmost confidentiality and data integrity in consonance with the Data Privacy Act and other applicable laws and regulations.

SECTION 8. BUDGETARY REQUIREMENTS. Expenses to be incurred for the implementation of this Ordinance, shall be charged against the General Funds of the respective Barangay, subject to existing budgeting, accounting, and auditing rules and procedures.

SECTION 9. PENALTIES. The following penalties shall be imposed for any act or omission violating this Ordinance, without prejudice to other existing and applicable laws, rules, and regulations:

- a. Lessor or Lessee
- 1) First Offense: Fine of One Thousand Pesos (₱1,000);
- 2) Second Offense: Fine of Three Thousand Pesos (₱3,000);
- 3)Third/Succeeding Offenses: Fine of Five Thousand Pesos (₱5,000).

b.In case of data breach occurring due to negligence, the PICs or its responsible officials are subject to the penalties specified in Sections 25-37, Chapter VII of the Data Privacy Act of 2012.

SECTION 10. PUBLICATION. This Ordinance shall be posted at prominent places in every barangay in three (3) consecutive weeks, published in a newspaper of general circulation within the territorial jurisdiction of Angeles City, the Angeles City Information Office shall publish the gist of this Ordinance in all available social media platforms, as necessary.

SECTION 11. SEPARABILITY CLAUSE. If for any reason or reasons, any part or provision of this Ordinance shall be held unconstitutional or invalid, other parts or provisions hereof which are not affected thereby shall continue to be in full force and effect.

SECTION 12. REPEALING CLAUSE. All ordinances, rules and regulations, or part thereof, where provisions are in conflict or contrary to the provisions of this Ordinance are hereby repealed, amended, or modified accordingly.

SECTION 13. EFFECTIVITY. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its approval.

If computed, Vicenta and Ildefonso are already 123 and 124 years old, respectively. Also, all their children, namely: Aurora, Ligaya, Pablo, Ruben, Ildefonso, Jose and Generoso, are all dead. Thus, the Honorable Court may take judicial notice of the death of Vicenta and

- 11. The aforesaid Transfer Certificate of Title No. 70337-R was issued on the 20th day of August 1969 and was derived from Original Transfer Certificate of Title No. 7653 which was issued pursuant to Decree No. 115738, L.R.C. Cad. Record No. 148 registered on 28th
- 12. The plaintiffs' ancestors have been in actual and physical possession of the subject property since time immemorial until their passing. This possession has been continuously maintained by the plaintiffs, as they have never been deprived of it up to the present.
- 13. Sometime in June 2014, the plaintiffs-heirs registered owners of the property held a meeting to partition the said property among the existing heirs. Plaintiff Pedrito Luzung was tasked by the family to look after the documentation of the partition on the lots. He referred the matter to a Geodetic Engineer to prepare the plan of
- 14. Thereafter, plaintiff Pedrito L. Luzung was informed by his Geodetic Engineer that the plan of partition cannot be made because the Bureau of Lands approved plans of partition pertaining to patent
- 15. Immediately, Engr. Luzung went to the CENRO Pampanga to verify the findings of the Geodetic Engineer and there, he found out that several patents were already issued to Spouses Efrain Juan L. Soto. Jr. and Zelinda Barrios Soto, and herein defendant Cherryl Tuazon Garbes on the same land covered by TCT No. 70337-R.
- To check on these patent titles, Engr. Luzung went to the Assessor's Office of Bacolor, Pampanga where he discovered that several tax declarations have been issued to Efrain Juan Soto and herein defendant Cherryl Tuazon Garbes on the same land based on the patent titles.
- 17. Along with the patent titles issued by CENRO Pampanga to Spouses Soto, the following patent titles were issued to herein defendant Cherryl Tuazon Garbes, with their respective assessed value as per their tax declarations, are as follows:

18. Also discovered by the plaintiffs are the existence of approved plans covering the subject land, all issued without the consent of the plaintiffs or their ascendants. As it appears on records, the approved plan that contains Cadastral Lot 323 of Bacolor, Pampanga as described on TCT No. 70337-R of the plaintiffs was cancelled by the Bureau of Lands without the consent and conformity of the plaintiffs. As a result, subdivision plan Csd-03-017129 was approved on September 13, 2006 resulting into the subdivision of Lot 323 into Lots 323-A to 323-D. 36

 On November 3, 2006, the Bureau of Lands again approved another subdivision plan without the consent of the plaintiffs, this time covering Lot 323-D, subdividing the same and changing it to Lot Nos. 4004-A to 4004-L as per subdivision plan, Csd-03-017312.37

20. During their lifetime, some of the predecessors 20. During their illettine, some or the predecessors-in-microsor of the plaintiffs through herein plaintiff Pedrito L. Luzung filed a case against Sps. Efrain Juan L. Soto and Zelinda Barrios Soto and defendant Cherryl Tuazon Garbes. The nature of the said case is similar to this case except that it also prayed for Declaration of Unenforceability of Mortgage (involving Spouses Sotos titles) and all Proceedings had thereon. It was docketed as Civil Case No. 14264, originally raffled at Regional Trial Court Branch 42 City of San Fernando, Pampanga, and was thereafter re-raffled to Branch 44 of the same jurisdiction. However, the case against defendant Cherryl Tuazon Garbes was dismissed without prejudice, ³⁶ hence this re-filling. Thereafter, the Presiding Judge of RTC Branch 44 inhibited herself

III. FIRST CAUSE OF ACTION - QUIETING OF TITLE

21. The remedy of quieting of title is governed by Article 476 and 477 of the Civil Code, which state:

or any interest therein, by reason of any instrument, record claim, encumbrance or proceeding which is apparently valid or effective but is in truth and in fact invalid. ineffective, voidable, or unenforceable, and may be prejudicial to said title, an action may be brought to remove such cloud or to quiet the title.

An action may also be brought to prevent a cloud from being cast upon title to real property or any interest

"Art. 477. The plaintiff must have legal or equitable title to, or interest in the real property which is the subject-matter of the action. He need not be in possession of said

- 22. As held by the Honorable Supreme Court in the case of Sps. Ernesto Yu and Elsie Yu vs. Elogio A. Topacio Jr. 39 , in order that an action for quieting of title may prosper, two requisites must concur: (1) the plaintiff or complainant has a legal or equitable title or interest in the real property subject of the action; and (2) the deed, claim, encumbrance, or proceeding claimed to be casting cloud on his title must be shown to be in fact invalid or inoperative despite its prima facie appearance of validity or legal efficacy.
- 23. The first requisite is based on Article 477 of the Civil Code which requires that the plaintiff must have legal or equitable title to, or interest in the real property which is the subject matter of the action. It is beyond dispute that Lot 323 (covered by TCT No. 70337-R) subject of the instant case is among the list of real or immovable property enumerated under Article 415 of the Civil Code⁴⁰

- 24. Legal title denotes registered ownership, while equitable title means beneficial ownership, ⁴¹ meaning a title derived through a valid contract or relation and based on recognized equitable
- In the instant case, the plaintiffs have a valid cause of action against the defendants herein for Quieting of Title on the
 - Plaintiffs are the successors-in-interest and compulsory heirs of the deceased registered owners Vicenta Galang Vda. De Labung, Domingo Labung, and Ignacia Licup thus they have all the legal right, title, claim or interest over the subject real property
 - The patent titles issued to Spouses Efrain Juan L. Soto Jr. and Zelinda Barrios Soto and herein defendant Cherryl Tuazon Garbes as well as all their corresponding tax declarations, subdivision plans, and lot data computation sheets, are documents, records or claims which appear to be valid on their faces although the truth is, they emanated from fraudulent means. These patent titles, tax declarations, subdivision plans and lot data computation beautions. sheets per se, cast a cloud to plaintiffs' claim, title, interest sneets per se, cast a cloud to planntins claim, title, interest or ownership over the subject Lot 323 because looking on the said documents or records, they would seem to connote ownership by Spouses Efrain Juan Soto Jr. and Zelinda Barrios Soto herein defendant Cherryl Tuazon Garbez of the portions of Lot 323.
- 26. This claim of ownership and existence of patent titles and tax declarations under the name of Spouses Efrain Juan Soto Jr. and Zelinda Barrios Soto and defendant Cherryl Tuazon Garbes <u>involving</u> the same Lot 323 necessarily creates a cloud in the title of the plaintiffs over the subject property which is sought to be removed through the institution of the instant action.
 - IV. SECOND CAUSE OF ACTION CANCELLATION OF PATENT TITLES, SUBDIVISION PLANS, LOT DATA COMPUTATION SHEETS, AND TAX DECLARATIONS
- As previously stated, on the basis of the aforesaid plans which were illegally approved and unauthorized, the patent titles in the

names of Sps. Soto and herein defendant Cherryl Tuazon Garbes

- 28. The issuance of the said subdivision plans and patent titles are clearly VOID from the beginning. The approval of the plans does not bear the consent of the plaintiffs or their predecessors-in-interest. The issuance of the patent titles is also VOID considering that the subject lot has already been issued a decree of registration by the Court of First Instance of Pampanga acting as Cadastral Court in LR.C. Cad. Record No. 148. As per plaintiffs' title, Decree No. 115738 was issued and properly registered on the 28th day of November 1921 in the Register of Deeds of Pampanga. Pursuant to this Decree No. 115738, Original Certificate of Title No. 7653 was issued. The present title of the plaintiffs' predecessors-in-interest, TCT No. 70337-R issued on August 20, 1969, was derived from this OCT No. 7653. It is still valid and existing in the Register of Deeds of Pampanga.43
- 29. Once a lot is issued a decree, it can no longer be applied 29. Once a lot is issued a decree, it can no longer be applied for a patent, much more be issued a patent title. To do so would result in duplication of the titles covering the same property with different conflicting owners. The resulting titles are clearly VOID being inimical to the evils being prevented by the Torrens System of Land Registration. Clearly, the defendant Garbes's approved subdivision plans, lot data computation sheets and patent titles are VOID and produce no legal effect as against the title of herein plaintiffs'
- 30. Hence, under Sections 31 and 32 of Presidential Decree No. 1529, the decree on the land is incontrovertible and indefeasible,

Section 31. Decree of registration. Every decree of registration issued by the Commissioner shall bear the date, hour and minute of its entry, and shall be signed by him. It shall state whether the owner is married or unmarried, and if married, the name of the husband or wife: Provided, however, that if the land adjudicated by the court is conjugal property, the decree shall be issued in the name of both spouses. If the owner is under disability, it shall state the nature of disability, and if a minor, his age. It shall contain a description of the land as finally determined by the court, and shall set forth the estate of the owner, and also, in such manner as to show their relative priorities, all particular estates, mortgages, easements, liens, attachments, and other encumbrances, including rights of tenant-farmers, if

any, to which the land or owner's estate is subject, as well as any other matters properly to be determined in pursuance of this Decree

The decree of registration shall bind the land and The decree of registration shall blind the land and quiet title thereto, subject only to such exceptions or liens as may be provided by law. It shall be conclusive upon and against all persons, including the National Government and all branches thereof, whether mentioned by name in the application or notice, the same being included in the general description "To all whom it may concern".

Section 32. Review of decree of registration; for value. The decree of registration shall not be reopened or revised by reason of absence, minority, or other disability of any person adversely affected thereby, nor by any proceeding in any court for reversing judgments subject, however, to the right of any person, including the government and the branches thereof, deprived of land or of any estate or interest therein by such adjudication or confirmation of title obtained by actual fraud, to file in the proper Court of First Instance a petition for reopening and review of the decree of registration not later than one year from and after the date of the entry of such decree of registration, but in no case shall such petition be entertained by the court where an innocent purchaser for value has acquired the land or an interest therein, whose rights may be prejudiced. Whenever the phrase "innocent purchaser for value" or an equivalent phrase occurs in this Decree, it shall be deemed to include an innocent lessee, mortgagee, or other encumbrancer for value

Upon the expiration of said period of one year, the decree of registration and the certificates of title issued shall become incontrovertible. Any person aggrieved by such decree of registration in any case may pursue his remedy by action for damages st the applicant or any other persons (emphasis, supplied).

31. Likewise, by the very provision of Commonwealth Act No 141 on application for and approval of patent titles, it is clear that no patent title shall be issued to lands already owned by private persons,

Section 8. Only those lands shall be declared open to disposition or concession which have been officially delimited and classified and, when practicable, surveyed, and which have not been reserved for public or quasi-public uses, nor appropriated by the Government, nor in any manner become private property, nor those on which a private right authorized and recognized by this Act or any other valid law may be claimed, or which, having been reserved or appropriated, have ceased to be so However, the President may, for reasons of public interest, declare lands of the public domain open to disposition before the same have had their boundaries established or been surveyed, or may, for the same reason, suspend their concession or disposition until they are again declared open to concession or disposition by proclamation duly published or by Act of the National Assembly. (Emphasis, supplied).

V. THIRD CAUSE OF ACTION - DAMAGES AND ATTORNEY'S FEES

- 32. By reason of the unlawful subdivisions of Lot 323, the illegal application for issuance of patent titles and approval and issuance of patent titles made in favor of defendant Cherryl Tuazon Garbes by the Bureau of Land-Region III and the CENRO-Pampanga the plaintiffs were compelled to engage the services of counsel to litigate this case, where they agreed to pay attorney's fees in the amount of ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND PESOS (P100,000.00) and appearance fee of Five Thousand Pesos (P5,000.00) per court appearance. In addition, defendants shall be compelled to pay the filing fee of this Complaint and all other related expenses, the amount of which shall be proven during the trial of this case
- 33. All the foregoing fees and expenses must be awarded to the plaintiffs and must be paid, jointly and solidarily by the Bureau of Lands-Region III and CENRO-PAMPANGA for having acted in bad faith or in gross neglect of their sworn duties and responsibilities and by Cherryl Tuazon Garbes who have acted in bad faith.

VI. JURISDICTION

34. Civil Case No.14264 was filed before the Regional Trial Court in pursuance with the case of Sabitsana vs. Muertegui⁴⁴, where the Honorable Supreme Court categorically stated that:

"On the question of jurisdiction, it is clear under the Rules that an action for quieting of title may be instituted in the RTCs, regardless of the assessed value of the real property in dispute Under Rule 63 of the Rules of Court, an action to quiet title to real property or remove clouds therefrom may be brought in the appropriate RTC.

It must be remembered that the suit for quieting of title was prompted by petitioners' August 24, 1998 letter-opposition to respondent's application for registration. Thus, in order to prevent a cloud from being cast upon his application for a title, respondent filed Civil Case No. B-1097 to obtain a declaration of his rights. In this sense, the action is one for declaratory relief which properly falls within the jurisdiction of the RTC pursuant to Rule 63 of the Rules."

The instant case however, is being filed in pursuance with the <u>prevailing and latest</u> Decision of the Honorable Supreme Court in the case of *Guillermo Salvador et. al vs. Patricia, Inc.*⁴⁵, where it held

"But the same was not true in the case of the cause of action for the guieting of title, which had the nature of a real action that is, an action that involves the issue of ownership or possession of real property, or any interest in real property in view of the expansion of the jurisdiction of the first level out or the purisdiction of the first level of the purisdiction of the size of pertinently provide as follows:

Section 33. Jurisdiction of Metropolitan Trial Courts, Municipal Trial Courts and Municipal Circuit Trial Courts in Civil Cases. - Metropolitan Trial Courts, Municipal Trial Courts and Municipal Circuit Trial Courts shall exercise

(3) Exclusive original jurisdiction in all civil actions which involve title to, possession of, real property, or any interest therein where the assessed value of the property or therein where the assessed value of the property or interest therein does not exceed Twenty thousand pesos (P20,000.00) or, in civil actions in Metro Manila, where such assessed value does not exceeds (sic) Fifty thousand pesos (P50,000.00) exclusive of interest, damages of whatever kind, attorneys fees, litigation expenses and

As such, the determination of which trial court had the exclusive original jurisdiction over the real action is dependent on the assessed value of the property in dispute.

Page 14

An action to quiet title is to be brought as a special civil action under Rule 63 of the *Rules of Court*. Although Section 1 of Rule 63 specifies the forum to be "the appropriate Regional Trial Court," the specification does not override the statutory provision on jurisdiction. xxx

It is important to note that <u>Section 1, Rule 63 of the Rules of Court does not categorically require that an action to quiet title <u>be filed before the RTC.</u> It repeatedly uses the word "may"- that an action for quieting of title "may be brought under [the] Rule"</u> on petitions for declaratory relief, and a person desiring to file a petition for declaratory relief "may x x x bring an action in the appropriate Regional Trial Court." The use of the word "may" in a statute denotes that the provision is merely permissive and indicates a mere possibility, an opportunity or an option

In contrast, the mandatory provision of the Judiciary Reorganization Act of 1980, as amended, uses the word shall and explicitly requires the MTC to exercise exclusive original jurisdiction over all civil actions which involve title to or possession of real property where the assessed value does not exceed P20,000.00, thus:

(Underscoring and emphasis supplied)

Also, in the case of Montero vs. Montero⁴⁶, the Honorable Supreme Court said that:

"According to jurisprudence, "[i]n a number of cases, [the Court has] held that actions for reconveyance of or for cancellation of title to or to quiet title over real property are actions that fall under the classification of cases that involve [']title to, or possession of, real property, or any interest therein."

37. In this connection, Section 2 of REPUBLIC ACT NO. 11576, July 30, 2021, otherwise known as AN ACT FURTHER EXPANDING THE JURISDICTION OF THE METROPOLITAN TRIAL COURTS, MUNICIPAL TRIAL COURTS IN CITIES, MUNICIPAL TRIAL COURTS, AND MUNICIPAL CIRCUIT TRIAL COURTS, AMENDING FOR THE PURPOSE BATAS PAMBANSA BLG. 129, OTHERWISE KNOWN AS "THE JUDICIARY REORGANIZATION ACT OF 1980," AS AMENDED, states: Section 2. Section 33 of the same law is hereby amended to

Jurisdiction of the Metropolitan Trial Courts, Municipal Trial Courts in Cities, Municipal Trial Courts, and Municipal Circuit Trial Courts in Civil Cases. - Metropolitan Trial Courts, Municipal Trial Courts in Cities, Municipal Trial Courts, and Municipal Circuit Trial Courts shall exercise:

"(3) Exclusive original jurisdiction in all civil actions which involve title to, or possession of, real property, or any interest therein where the assessed value of the property or any interest therein does not exceed Four hundred thousand pesos (P400,000.00) exclusive on interest, damages of whateve kind, attorney's fees, litigation expenses and costs: *Provided*, That in cases of land not declared for taxation purposes, the value of such property shall be determined by the assessed value of the adjacent lots."

38. The assessed value of the subject property based on Tax Declaration No. GR2020-03-0019-03377 is P9,890.00. While in the two <u>questioned</u> Tax Declaration No. A-04019-1879-A and Tax Declaration No. A-04019-1880-A have assessed values of P570.00 and P580.00, respectively. Hence, the instant Complaint involving title to and possession of the said property is within the exclusive original jurisdiction of this Honorable Court.



For his part, Lo said it revives FTI's original mission of linking farmers directly to consumers. "The hub will encourage producers and entrepreneurs, ensure fair farm-gate prices, lower food costs, reduce post-harvest losses, create jobs, and stabilize supply.'

Alcazar expressed gratitude to FTI for its partnership, emphasizing that the initiative marks

a major milestone in promoting sustainable agricultural growth and ensuring a more efficient food value chain nationwide as well as improving the country's food security.

One of CIAC's flagship projects, the Clark National Food Hub is viewed as 'a major step forward in the transformation of the aviation complex into the Clark Aviation Capital."

CIAC serves as

the aviation and land development arm of the BCDA, while FTI is a government-owned corporation and a subsidiary of the National Food Authority which engages in supporting the agricultural sector by providing facilities for food processing, storage, and distribution, linking producers with consumers, and promoting price stability.

Capitol Forum...

Summit on Strengthening School Leadership in Disaster Preparedness and Community Wellness held at the Kingsborough International Convention Center here on Oct. 28.

Aimed at empowering education officials to champion safety and resilience in schools, the Capitol sponsored summit served as a platform for school heads to share best practices, enhance their disaster response capabilities, and promote community wellness.

Enhancing preparedness and response

Provincial disaster risk reduction and management office chief Janica Yambao presented practical measures for disaster preparedness covering earthquakes, fires, typhoons, and flooding, along with the implementation of Department of Education Order No. 22, s. 2024 on class suspensions during weather disturbances.

The provincial

government continues to strengthen school preparedness through the distribution of early warning systems, emergency supplies, and safety equipment, as well as the regular inspection of school facilities and the conduct of safety drills to ensure safe learning environments.

Ensuring campus security

To further promote school safety, the Pampanga Police Provincial Office led by Col. Eugene Marcelo, conducted a briefing on managing bomb threats and other security incidents.

Marcelo advised school officials to remain calm, coordinate promptly with law enforcement, and avoid panic during any potential threats or emergencies.

Promoting mental health and student wellness

Beyond disaster preparedness, the summit also highlighted the importance of mental health and psychosocial support in schools.

In collaboration with Dr. Monserrat Chichioco, medical center chief of the Jose B. Lingad Memorial General Hospital, and Atty. Hannah Rosario of the Commission on Human Rights Region 3, the provincial government introduced a biopsychosocialspiritual framework aimed at transforming guidance offices into centers of care and compassion—safe spaces where students can seek help and emotional support.

Through partnerships with the DepEd and

health professionals, the **Provincial Government** of Pampanga continues to strengthen programs that promote student wellness, health protection, and disaster readinessreaffirming its steadfast mission, as emphasized by Governor Pineda, to build safe, resilient, and compassionate learning environments where every Kapampangan learner can grow in body, mind, and spirit. earthquakes and volcanic eruptions. Aside from earthquakes, we also experience an average of 20 typhoons per year," Lazatin noted.

"The integration of disaster preparedness and response as a subject in our school curriculum will empower our students by

giving them the tools to face disaster situations and keep themselves as safe as possible until proper help arrives," he added.

If passed, HB 5605 tasks the Department of Education, in coordination with the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council, Philippine Institute of Volcanology and Seismology, Philippine Atmospheric Geophysical and Astronomical Administration, Bureau of Fire Protection, and the Department of the Social Welfare and Development to promulgate the implementing rules and regulations 180 days from the effectivity of the law.

On Oct. 13, Lazatin also filed House Resolution No. 368 requesting DepEd to postpone face-toface classes and shift to alternative modes of learning, such as modules and online classes, for a period of at least two weeks in public and private schools nationwide to give time for the formulation of

guidelines on disaster and emergency preparedness and response in schools.

"We need to have clear and specific guidelines on how the administration, school personnel, teachers, and students will act and respond during disasters and emergencies," Lazatin said. *Team Lazatin Media*

- CSFWD oversight findings and monitoring
- · Public disclosure of contractual compliance by PrimeWater
- Open consultations where consumers can raise auestions
- Transparency in how decisions affecting water access are made

Despite numerous complaints from households and businesses, no clear actions or public explanations have been provided by CSFWD leadership. In fact, it is now the Mayor of San Fernando who has stepped forward to address the worsening

water situation, a task that should have been primarily led by CSFWD.

The silence of the water district remains deeply alarming.

Unanswered questions

We are aware that discussions regarding the possible pre-termination of the JVA were raised. However.

- · No public disclosure was made
- · No consultation with stakeholders occurred
- PrimeWater continues to operate without visible accountability
- Service complaints continue to escalate

Are the subscribers being informed, or are we being deliberately kept uninformed?

The people demand transparency We now formally call

- 1. Full disclosure and publication of the Joint Venture Agreement
- 2.A performance audit of PrimeWater based on contractual and legal obligations
- 3. A complete public report on CSFWD's oversight actions since the start of the JVA
- 4. Public consultations where Fernandinos are heard and respected

Accountability and legal action

If records reveal that the CSFWD Board of Directors, past or present, was negligent, failed to perform mandatory oversight, or allowed consumer welfare to deteriorate, then:

- Administrative and criminal cases shall be filed before the Office of the Ombudsman
- Possible suspension, dismissal, and perpetual disqualification from public office may result under RA 6713 and RA 3019
- Local Water Utilities Administration (LWUA) may be requested to intervene and assume oversight
- · Civil actions for damages may also be pursued on behalf of affected households and businesses

Public office is a public trust, and trust must never

be betrayed.

If CSFWD cannot protect the people, if it can no longer serve its legal purpose, then it is time to restructure or replace the arrangement entirely to ensure:

- Clear accountability
- Enforceable service standards
- Protection of the consumers' welfare

Because water is a basic right. Because no Fernandino should suffer due to mismanagement. This is not political. This is not personal. This is public welfare. We, as consumers, taxpayers, and citizens, will not hesitate to bring this case to the courts and to the Office of the Ombudsman if necessary. The time for
